GENERAL NEWS.

THE "VENERABLE JURIST" HAS NO INTENTION OF RETIRING.

Washington, November 12.—The rumor has been revived today that Justice Field is to retire from the supreme bench, and that President Cleveland is to appoint Secretary Carlisle to succeed him. "The Examiner" correspondent has learned, however, that there is nothing on which to found such a rumor and that Justice Field will not resign while this administration is in power. Mr. Cleveland would be gratified if such an opportunity were offered to place Carlisle on the supreme bench, but Justice Field will not leave until after March 4th.

The venerable jurist has for years desired a longer term on the bench than any of his predecessors. "This wish was gratified last summer, and he can now retire at any time, but his intense dislike for Cleveland and his dislike to have him appoint his successor will operate to keep him in the service, although he is physically unable to attend to his duties.

LITTLE ITALY STEPS TO THE FRONT.

Constantinople, Nov. 14.—Signor Pansa, the Italian ambassador, had an audience last evening with the sultan. He strongly insisted upon the execution of the proposed reforms. The sultan declared they would be executed. Signor Pansa pointed out that it was not sufficient to publish the reforms. It was necessary to carry them out. The Italian ambassador also insisted upon the punishment by no more court-martials of Colonel Masaban Rey, who is held responsible for the murder of Father Salvator.

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BOSTON MANUFACTURERS CUT WAGES.

After Promising Their Employees an Increase in the Event of McKinley's Election.

Boston, November 12.—L. C. Chase & Co. of 129 Washington street, the largest manufacturers of horse goods in New England, have announced a cut in the wages of their employees. The members of the firm are prominent Republicans and belong to the Home Market Club. During the campaign placards promising more work and increased wages if McKinley were elected were prominently posted in the workrooms, while the management threatened a complete shut-down in case Bryan should win. The contemplated reduction was proposed last week and led to a partial strike on Monday, which is still on.

Philadelphia, November 12.—The wages of employees of the Baldwin Locomotive Works in this city have been reduced this week by from 12 to 20 per cent.
