Another incident: A gentleman who accumulated quite a fortune in the mercantile business, and having a favorite nephew, helped him to a lucrative position, and later furnished him means to embark in the banking business. He was covetous and prospered. Years passed. During the great panic of 1873, the old gentleman went down in the financial wreck with many others. He was old and decrepit. He lacked the necessities of life, and remembering the aid he had given the nephew, he little dreamed he would be refused when he applied to him for aid. The poor, old fellow, in his grief exclaimed: "How ungrateful! All my life I have made sacrifices for humanity, only to die at last, with no friends, not even a kind word!"

When I read about men sacrificing means and time for other people, I am reminded of the above incidents. He who sacrifices for others, as a general thing, is little appreciated. Every time you help another, you weaken his faith in himself and injure yourself. Equal and exact justice is all that is needed. Parents indulge their children too much, and their independence is ruined, individuality destroyed. Their will power is weakened, and their power to withstand temptation and overcome the obstacles of life are destroyed forever. Many of our educated people today, if thrown on their own exertions, would soon be subjects for the poorhouse. Don't sit down and wait. L. S. Coon was down from his North Fork home on business last Wednesday. He lost two horses by the flood, and several neighbors in that section lost stock of one kind or another.

The "Northern Coal Co.," organized as mentioned in last issue of the HERALD to develop the mines on the east side of this place, will take out 100 tons for shipment on the Chilkat to Portland.

More accidents have been occurring in the mines at Beaver Hill. Early last week Pete and Fred Reber, brothers, were burned by a slight explosion of gas in the mine, one of them quite badly. On Wednesday a Mr. Black was hurt by a rock falling and striking him on the head. The hurt was not much, but was a close call to more serious results. These accidents are common occurrences in mines, even with the exercise of the greatest care.

Thanksgiving day was probably better observed by suspension of business at this place and as a general holiday than ever before. A morning service was held at the Methodist church, not largely attended, to be sure, but appropriate and edifying nevertheless. The literary and musical program at night, by the Christian Sunday-school, and "lunch," were attractions and passed off delightfully. There was a large audience and a liberal patronage of the lunch.

Oregonian: There is not only a city ordinance against selling cigarettes to minors, but a state law forbidding sale to such persons of tobacco in any form. The state law also has the sensible provision that the offender himself may be punished. Minors under 18 who "smoke or in any way use any cigar, cigarette or tobacco in any form whatsoever in any public highway, street, place, square or resort" may be fined from \$1, to \$10 or imprisoned two days for each offense.

The little steamer Chilkat reached this place from Portland last Tuesday night, about 10 o'clock, and left again at 6 in the morning. Our people would have been glad to have received the new visitor more heartily, but her advent was sudden, after delay by a storm, and her departure quite as unexpected. Our people would have been glad to have greeted both the vessel and her gallant captain, and shall hope to do so on the next visit. Elder J. U. G. Stiverson and family, of Norway, took passage for Oyster-ville, Pacific county, Wash.

Several of our citizens entered into the spirit of the thanksgiving season last week, from various causes, and possibly all reasonable enough. Brother Strang was thankful that the chicken-thief who robbed his roost didn't take them all, even while he should have preferred that if the party so trespassing had been in want and made the fact known he would have done an act of thankfulness and given him to the value of what was stolen, or more, and additionally thankful that his fellowmen, rich or poor, were honest and retained his confidence. THE WIRE NAIL TRUST COLLAPSES.

Not Per Force of the Law Nor the Legal Authorities, But of Its Own Rotteness.

Cleveland, Nov. 22.—The news from Chicago of the collapse of the wire-nail trust was not surprising to some of the manufacturers in this city. Ten days ago it was predicted the trust would cut the price from \$2.60 to \$1.75 a keg to meet the competition of outside manufacturers who could not be bought up by the pool. A representative of the American Wire Works Company, one of the Cleveland concerns which has been controlled by the trust, said today his company received notice a month ago that the payment of subsidies would stop on the 4th of this month. In consequence, the company had arranged to start 24 machines manufacturing nails on the 25th of the month. This manufacturer declared the buying up of competitors had become too expensive, and the trust was forced to quit. It is now predicted the nail manufacturers who have been released from the agreement will combine to make war on the steel pool, which has been charging discriminating prices of billets to wire manufacturers who are outside the influence of the pool.

A Double Object in View.

The Transvaal government has a double object in view in demanding £1,000,000 indemnity from the British South Africa Company, to cover the damage done by Jameson's raid. The expense caused to the Boers by that expedition probably did not reach a tenth of that sum, but they are a thrifty folk, and see in the event a chance for profit; besides which they aim to punish the company for its unwarranted interference in their affairs. The company's prompt disclaimer of Jameson's enterprise did not avail with public opinion at the time, since its responsibility was clearly proven, nor will it carry weight with the Boers, but it will probably need all of President Kruger's sagacity to collect the fine without involving his state in fresh competition with the British government.—Philadelphia Ledger.
