The State School Fund.

The irreducible school fund is invested in loans on real estate security, throughout the state. The amount of the fund, as shown by the report of ex-School Clerk G. W. Davis, to the last legislature, was \$2,089,789.76.

This fund is under the control of the state school land board. The board consists of the governor, secretary of state and treasurer. In each county of the state, the board has an attorney, who acts as agent, through whom loans are made. The attorneys have been instructed under the present board to guard carefully as agent, through whom loans are placed. That the borrower on land shall have a clear title thereto, and that interest and taxes thereon be kept up are essential to the safety of the fund.

Thirty-two different agents, looking after the securities, and the loans being made largely upon their recommendation, it is not surprising that delinquencies occur. The records show there has been more or less laxity in looking after the irreducible school funds in different parts of the state. It may be the fund sustains only a proportionate loss to other capital in other business, under a general shrinkage of values; but there are grounds to question the present system of caring for the school fund. It has been suggested by some who have observed the operation of the present system, that it be made a part of the attorney-general's duty to look after the fund.

Government Surveys.

The sum of \$13,500 has been allotted to the state of Oregon from the annual appropriation for surveying government lands, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1897. Settlers residing upon unsurveyed land, who are desirous of having same surveyed by the government, should make application at once. Blank applications may be had at the U. S. Land Office at Roseburg, Oregon.

Bragg Advocate: The following is a result of an analysis of a cigarette, made recently by a physician: "The tobacco was found to be strongly impregnated with opium, while the wrapper, which was warranted to be rice paper, was proven to be the most ordinary quality of paper whitened with arsenic. The two poisons combined were present in sufficient quantities to create in the smoker a habit of using opium without his being aware of it, his craving for which can only be satisfied by an incessant consumption of cigarettes." These facts would be sufficient to stop the manufacture of anything less insidious in its influence. But smokers will smoke on to their death.

The supreme court has recently decided that a patent right cannot be levied upon and sold to settle a judgment. The court holds that a patent right is not susceptible of a levy on execution as it is neither "personal property capable of manual delivery," nor does it come under the category of "debts and credits." It can only be transferred by assignment.

The state capitol building is being rapidly put in order for the convening of the legislature, which opens in just one month. New carpets are being laid, new furniture put in and the electric lighting system put in good condition.

Medford's distilling and refining company's property was sold at public auction last Saturday. The property cost \$10,000 and was sold for between \$2000 and \$3000 and 20,000 gallons of whisky sold at 2 cents a gallon.
