Who are the tramps? What will this country be but a nation of movers and tramps in the near future unless some change is made in the system of doing business? Another election has passed with the assurance of a more vigorous continuation of the same old policy of the toilers producing wealth and the idlers accumulating it. Misery is increasing and the gulf is widening. We see but one certain way to bring speedy and lasting relief, and that is through a system that will employ the idle and give them a chance to live while a chance is coming about. Starving people cannot wait four more years for a change in the political policy, and the rich are seemingly indifferent. Hence the remedy lies at the hands of the laboring people through the Labor Exchange methods.

Do not be astonished when we state that not one editor out of a hundred knows enough about the finance question to write a truthful and correct article on money and its functions. Not one out of a thousand speakers and writers on money knows enough about finance and commerce to start a student on a correct basis, and hardly one in a million is fit to teach an advanced class of students who are seeking the truth in financial and industrial reform. Now what will you do about it? Will you continue to let them blunder on in their blindness trying to teach that which they do not understand, or will you get them to read and study our literature and aid in getting the people in line before they make some more foolish and fatal blunders which may ruin their chances for industrial liberty for ever? Do not put this matter off any longer. There is no time to fool away on partisan issues. For God's sake do something practical at once.

The board of equalization at Salem went over the item of merchandise at its sitting Monday of last week, and made no change in Coos and Curry counties' assessments. Nine other counties escaped any modification, while all the other counties in the state except Clatsop (which was decreased 16 2/3 per cent) were raised in sums of 10 to 25 per cent. On the assessments of city and town lots Coos had a reduction of 10 per cent, and Clatsop 30 per cent. Eleven other counties had a raise of 10 to 25 per cent.

This departure in gastronomy is said to have been introduced by the numerous Italian laborers who have settled in the Bavarian capital.

A cannon made of solid gold, mounted upon a carriage of rose-wood, inlaid with costly gems, is the unique bauble of warfare that has come into the possession of the imperial army of Berlin. As a valuable acquisition to the armament of the kaiser's own soldiery this unique fieldpiece is more interesting than terrible. No other armory in the world can boast of a field cannon so beautiful or so costly. This singular gun was presented to the Berlin army by the managers of the Hamburg museum, in whose keeping it has been for two centuries. Guns of this sort are not produced today, and war is made with cannon, which are more effective in their destruction than any others than pleasing to the aesthetic taste. The outward appearance of this monster jewel is most delicate in workmanship. It is valued at £5000, though, as a matter of fact, it could not be purchased for twice that amount of money. The liveliest interest in this marvelous military engine has been evinced by the Emperor William, and he has ordered a special guard to be placed over the precious cannon, which, two days in a week, is on view to the curious Berliners and the strangers within the German capital's gates.

The annual report of Hon. Dominic I. Murphy, commissioner of pensions, to the secretary of the interior, shows that there are now 4963 persons residing in the state of Washington and drawing pensions, the aggregate amount of which is \$676,446.04. In Idaho there are 1070 pensioners, and they drew last year \$148,425.84. The oldest surviving widow of a revolutionary soldier is Mrs. Lovey Aldrich, widow of Caleb Aldrich, who saw service in New Hampshire and Rhode Island. Mrs. Aldrich is 96 years old, and lives at Los Angeles, California. There are six other revolutionary widows, and most of them bid fair to live a score of years yet. Seven daughters of revolutionary soldiers are still on the roll. Twice seven is the number of surviving soldiers and sailors of the war of 1812. Five of them are over 100 years old. The youngest lives in Baltimore and has just turned 90. The oldest has reached the ripe age of 104. His name is Hosea Brown, and he now lives at Grants Pass, Oregon.

W. P. Murphy, once a resident of this city, who was arrested and put in jail for debt, brought suit against the parties in the sum of \$500. The case was tried in Judge Sterns' court at Toledo, Lincoln county. He admitted the debt, but denied the right to be deprived of his liberty. The jury gave him a verdict for the full amount less the amount he owed.
