U'Ren, of Clackamas, they found they had waked up a man who was the most good-natured stayer ever in the legislature. "Nobody but a revolutionist would attempt to run a legislature with a minority," said U'Ren to Somers of Linn. The Populists did not supply the first attempt at revolutionary procedure.
