PROCEEDINGS OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE FROM DAY TO DAY.

House Held a Session Sunday and Benson Men a Caucus.

Salem, Jan. 18.—The house carried out the program mapped out on Saturday, and held a session Sunday to meet the requirements of the constitution. Nothing new developed at the session.

The protracted hold-up of the lower house of the state legislature is a source of much grief to the numerous applicants for clerkships who have been infesting the capitol since the opening day of the session.

Salem, Or., Jan. 19.—In the senate today Senator Driver brought up his bill relating to the organization of the legislature and tried to rush it through to a final passage.

The bill provides that when a member of either house refuses to participate in the organization he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$50 nor more than \$500.

The senate then adjourned till tomorrow. MORE BILLS INTRODUCED IN SENATE.

Salem, Jan. 19.—The senate was called to order yesterday at 2:30 p. m. and after the introduction by Dawson of a memorial from the taxpayers of Brownville, asking for economy in appropriations and the abolishment of useless commissions, the following bills were presented:

Senator Gowan, Bates and Taylor were appointed a committee to investigate the accounts and books of the state librarian.
