Stumbling Blocks.

There are difficulties that beset the path of every Labor Exchange Branch when it first begins active business operations, and in some cases these difficulties prove so insurmountable as to prevent the development, if not to completely annihilate the movement in that section.

One of the greatest troubles with which a branch meets comes from within, that is from dissatisfied members. Many join the movement simply because they believe there is an opportunity for them to turn a direct penny into their own pockets. When this element finds that it cannot control the business affairs of the branch and use it to their individual profit, they at once begin to discover "weak spots" and eventually proclaim the movement a failure. The worst feature of this difficulty is that the harm is always done on the outside, and those unacquainted with the affairs of the branch accept the dictum of these affected members as correct, because of their connection with the movement. The sooner this deadwood can be disposed of the brighter the Labor Exchange fire will burn.

Another great difficulty with which a new branch generally has to contend is the scarcity of level-headed business men to direct its business affairs. Not that there is not a sufficiency of material in the ranks, but simply because our business men are so engaged in clubbing the wolf from their own doors that they do not see the way clear to give their time and interest to the business of the branch. There must be sacrifice made both of time and means to make the movement successful in any locality.

Again the difficulty with which many branches located in the larger towns meet, is to surmount all the tricks of trade put upon the public by unscrupulous dealers. Many Labor Exchanges unaccustomed to co-operation, become disheartened because they cannot purchase any article from the Depository below cost, some dealer in the same community advertises to sell that article below cost.

These troubles are but a part of the list which beset new branches. Some become discouraged and give up the struggle when they are just at the point where the tide is about to turn. Others stand firm, profit by the mistakes they and other branches make, and push on to success.—The Director.
