

THE LABOR EXCHANGE.

The Labor Exchange is a world-wide association (incorporated). Its mission is to devise ways and means to employ its members by a system of exchange, as follows: By making it possible for anyone to take a part or the whole of his wages in the product of his employer; by providing a deposit warehouse where goods received in lieu of cash for wages can be deposited; by issuing deposit and exchange checks to the depositor for the value of said goods; by a systematized method of exchanging said checks for any goods said check-holder may select in the warehouse to the face value of said check; when the exchange has been consummated the check is cancelled. The Labor Exchange monetizes every article that has a commercial value. Its object is to establish the Brotherhood of Man. Its motto: "Do unto others as you would be done unto." Every business man, employe, farmer, mechanic or laborer, male or female, should become a member of this association. Only one dollar for a life membership. No dues or assessments. This is the grandest movement known to civilization.—W. A. Ellis, Organizer, Ashabula, Ohio.

Three things are absolutely necessary to production: Labor, land, and tools, and they must each be obtainable at the same time. The members of the Labor Exchange have labor and some tools, but no food (a product of land). Mr. Farmer, if you will invest just a little of your surplus product—loan it to the workers—they can produce plenty of wealth, and are perfectly willing to give you a share of it in proportion to the amount you contribute. In other words, you can turn that bacon and those potatoes into a brick building, a part of which you will own, without paying shillock the value of the improvement in interest for the loan of a measure (money) wherewith to measure the proportion each has contributed. Can't you see the possibilities of such a system? Isn't it perfectly plain that such an investment would be twice as profitable as one made in the old way, and that after awhile the drain of interest would cease to impoverish the people of this valley?

The Chicago Times-Herald says bread riots are threatened in that city, yet there are people who believe prosperity is returning. There never was a time when so many people searched in vain for an opportunity to work for a bare subsistence, and machinery and combinations of capital will continue to lessen opportunities day by day, and tariff or no tariff, under the present system there is going to be less and less demand for labor of men's hands. Co-operation between capital and machinery can only be met successfully by co-operation of the workers. If labor will simply learn to keep its productions, instead of selling them for a quarter of their worth, the workers will soon own the wealth of the world. And they can do it. The system that will emancipate them is being studied and tested by thousands, and is proving to be practical. Friend, you'd better investigate.

Monday witnessed the completion of the telephone line between the dock and offices of the Labor Exchange and the city; a great convenience to those desiring to do business with them. No 175 will be the number that will serve in this instance and the managers of the Exchange will live in the reasonable hope that their wire will be "kept hot" with inquiries and orders relative to wares and produce. The Exchange proposes also to supplement this with the re-establishment of the free delivery system at once.—Salem Independent.

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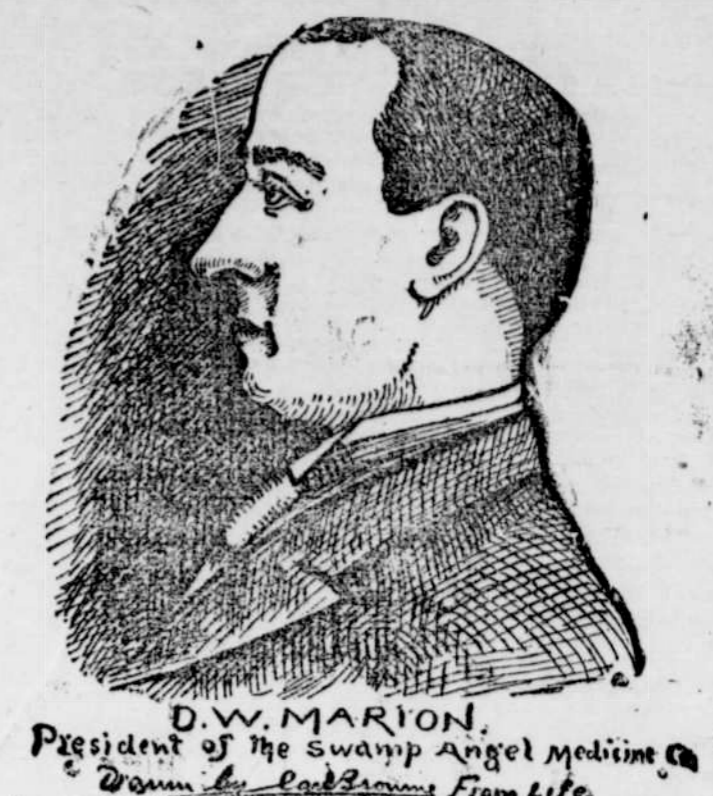
