

THE LABOR EXCHANGE.

Not an Experiment.

It is somewhat amusing to hear people referring to the Labor Exchange methods, as "the new system," "an experiment," etc. It reminds us of the fellow in Albany, Oregon, that knocked a Jew down for killing Christ. The system upon which the Labor Exchange is based and operated is as old as Time, and in fact is the only system ordained by natural law. This method of transacting business, was practiced by the colonial government of this country with success and satisfaction. Even after the adoption of our present form of government in this country, the people were loth to give up their long-cherished customs of exchanging the products of their labor for commodities that were shipped here from other countries for trade. Unfortunately, however, for the laboring class—a thorough system of keeping account of the exchange business was not systematized as we have it today, hence the adoption of a medium of exchange known as "legal tender," and the consequent speculation and discrimination against labor.—Inland Empire.

The Unit of Exchange.

There is much trouble in the teaching of finance, because most people cannot comprehend what should constitute the "unit of value." The term "unit of value" has a tendency to mislead the mind we prefer to call it "unit of exchange" or a basis upon which to reckon the relative value of one thing with another by a system of understood expressions; and there is no reason why we should not continue the decimal system of units, tens, hundreds, etc., with an ordinary day's labor or a certain amount of product from honest toil as the unit of calculation. Time itself does not create wealth but it takes skill and exertion in combination with it. Hence we conclude that the best plan is to compute the value of a unit by the fair average of an ordinary honest day's labor, or the result therefrom, as near as men can arbitrate it.—Progressive Thought.

Progressive Thought. We have had so much dealing with the human family that it makes us very familiar with its disposition. Selfishness is a predominant feature in most people to the extent of a desire for self-preservation at the unjust expense of others. Cost of Dairy Products.

At the recent meeting of the Western Ontario Dairymen's Association Prof. H. H. Dean, of the Guelph Dairy School, said that few men could be found who know what their dairy produce costs them. At the Guelph Station, where grain was bought off the market and pasture paid for at the rate of \$5 per acre, it cost from \$24.30 to \$39.89 per cow—an average per cow of \$31—to feed the dairy herd one year. Milk was produced at 4.9 cts per gallon from the best cow, and 10 cents per gallon from worst. Cheese cost from the best cow 3.9 cents, and from the worst 8.1 cents per pound. Butter from the best cow was produced at 8 1/2 cents per pound and from the worst at about 19 cents. The best cow's milk, if sold at 4 cents per quart, would yield a profit of \$89.46 for the food consumed; if her butter were sold at 20 cents per pound the profit would be \$47.30; and if her cheese were sold at 87 cents, she would yield \$21.18 of a return over and above the cost of food. To show the value of propretency of pure-bred cows it was shown that the daughter of the best cow produced butter before she was two years old at a cost of 9.1 cents per pound. In feeding the individuality of the cows must be noted in order to avoid under or over feeding.

Mrs. Amanda Way of Boston finds herself with a courthouse on her hands. Some years ago she bought \$25,000 worth of courthouse bonds on which principal and interest were defaulted. She foreclosed on the courthouse and is wondering what to do with it.
