The schooner Gen. Siglin, owned by the American Commercial Co., is long overdue at Wood Island, Alaska. The vessel left San Francisco March 23 laden with supplies for the company. Captain Jerome Thomas was in command. Besides the captain, she carried a crew consisting of a mate, cook and three sailors. E. C. Greenfield, his wife and three children were passengers. When the Siglin sailed a severe southwest had been blowing for some time, and a heavy cross sea was running all along the coast. The General Siglin was built at Marshfield, Or., 1894, for E. C. Cox, and was sold the following year to the Commercial Company. She is 89 feet in length by 22 feet beam and 6.3 depth, and is 81.2 tons register.

The several county superintendents have filed their annual reports with the state superintendent, except that of Gilliam county, and the increase of school age since last year is only 393. Coos county's scholastic census is put at 2043 males and 1982 females; total, 4025. Carry county enrolls 409 males and 340 females, total, 749.
