The ages of the children ranged between 4 and 12 years. The children had retired when the fire was started. White and his wife were away on a visit. Enemies of the family are believed to have fired the house.

NO CARRY THE CHARITY. Washington, May 26.—The secretary of the navy has accepted the offer of the owner of the American steamship City of Everett, now at San Francisco, to charter that vessel to the government for the transportation of grain from California to Bombay, for the famine sufferers, at \$40,000.

VALUABLE TELESCOPE STOLEN. Eugene, May 2.—Some thieves broke into the state university observatory last night, and stole therefrom the nine hundred dollar telescope. The robbery was discovered today at noon. No clue has been obtained yet.

A SPANISH VIEW. Madrid, June 1.—General Bernat has returned from Cuba and informed the ministers of war that prolonging the rebellion in Cuba is due only to the assistance the insurgents receive from the United States.

Heavy Fire Loss. Washington, Pa., June 1.—The entire works of the Novelty Glass Company, including two factory buildings, were destroyed by fire early this morning. The loss is \$70,000.
