### A Vision of the Night.

In my dream I thought I was in  
one of the large churches of your  
city. The usual evening service was  
in progress and the time for the  
commencement of the sermon had  
arrived. The minister arose, stepped  
to his place in the pulpit and an-  
nounced that instead of the usual  
sermon a well-known gambler, Mr. E.,  
would deliver a lecture on  
"Why I Am Not a Christian."  
A murmur of disapproval rose  
from the congregation, but when the  
lecturer was introduced it sub-  
sided from very amazement at such  
an unheard of occurrence. The  
lecturer was a good type of his class.  
The cold, merciless eye, thin lips,  
high cheeks, cheap jewelry—all  
were present, but with them an  
appearance of general intelligence  
considerably beyond the average of  
his class.

"Ladies and gentlemen," said he,  
"you are surprised to see me in this  
sacred place, no doubt. Yet you  
need not be. In addition to my  
gambling rooms I run a saloon and  
house of ill-fame, and your hus-  
bands, wives, sons, daughters, fathers  
and mothers are all among my  
patrons, hence I feel quite at home  
among you. Indeed, I make my  
money chiefly out of your families  
and others similar all over the city.  
If the ranks of the drunkards,  
prostitutes and others upon whom I  
depend for support were not re-

"During the past month or two a  
grand jury has been sitting in our  
city, and on the last day of June it  
reported among other things that  
"Scores of witnesses have been  
before the jury, and upon examina-

thing that would enable the jury to  
locate the principals. The lack of  
memory on the part of witnesses is  
appalling, they being determined at  
all hazards to shield the guilty  
parties."

"That grand jury was called to  
investigate election frauds, and they  
really reported that the disreputable

the moral, Christian element of this  
city. One great reason that I am

bers and sink them so low that the

"You, three-fourths, could easily,  
if you would, elect good men and

and vipers that crawled in their

Our attention has been called by  
a Dago to "The current reviews by  
Dun and Bradstreets," which, he  
says, "unite in reporting a 25 per  
cent gain in business the past week."  
We have been familiar with these  
commercial publications for more  
years than he is old, and are well  
on to their service in the cause of  
truth, prosperity and patriotism. We  
admit that prosperity has struck  
some of us. We admit also that  
the tariff has given our farmers  
superb crops of grain, hay, etc., and  
made a rich strike on the Klondyke.  
These are all palpable enough. It  
has also raised the incomes of  
Havemeyer, Hanna, Rockefeller, etc.,  
and started the mines in the east;  
the 68 cts. per ton duty on coal is  
distributed pro rata among the  
miners, while the consumers of the  
protected products are supplied at  
greatly reduced rates. The railroads,  
however, have raised the rates on grain  
to an amount equal to the rise in  
prices, all to the advantage of the  
farmers and consumers. Our local  
enterprises, also, feel the effects of  
restoration of confidence and since  
the passage of the Dingley bill are  
voluntarily raising the wages of  
their employes—notably the mines  
at Libby and the mill at this place.  
However, we had rather quote from  
Dun and Bradstreets than their little  
country lickspittles who, like the  
little snarling fink, keep up such a  
barking and whining that the people  
are not yet settled to the fact that  
prosperity is on. Carnegie and the  
Bethlehemsteels works have patri-  
otically offered to furnish Uncle Sam  
plates for her navy at \$390 a ton,

## WORK ON THE COAST.

What is Being Done Under Captain Fisk's  
Direction.

Work on the various river and  
harbor improvements along the  
Oregon coast, in charge of Captain  
Fisk, United States engineers, is  
progressing favorably.

At the mouth of the Coquille,  
D. Kern is building a jetty to im-  
prove the entrance. The rock for  
this work is being taken from one  
of the immense boulders of quartz,  
or something of the kind, which  
contain seams of pyrites. They  
are totally different from any rock  
deposits in that region, and, as  
nothing of the same kind is found  
nearer than Montana, it has been  
concluded that, notwithstanding  
they are each larger than a good-  
sized church, they were brought  
from Montana in the ice age. The  
material is excellent for jetty work,  
and it would have been a great con-  
venience and a great saving to the  
government if more such boulders  
had been dropped at places along  
the coast where jetties are required.  
Some dike work and snagging are  
also being done for the improve-  
ment of the upper Coquille, be-  
tween Coquille City and Myrtle  
Point.

At Coos bay, Messrs. Wakefield  
& Jacobson have a contract for in-  
creasing the height of the jetty.  
They are getting along very well  
with the job, putting in about 15-  
000 tons of rock per day. The  
jetty has proved very efficient,  
maintaining a depth of about 22  
feet on the bar. Captain Fisk has  
had a snagging plant placed on a  
scow, and started her up the river  
to do some dredging above Marsh-  
field—Oregonian, 9th inst.

MUST PAY THE BILL.

Secretary of State Compelled to Audit Ac-  
counts and Draw Warrants Due.

Salem, Aug. 9.—The supreme  
court today rendered decisions in  
the three mandamus suits brought  
to compel the secretary of state to  
audit claims and draw warrants in  
payment thereof.

In each case representing three  
classes of claims, the lower court  
is reversed and the secretary of  
state is required by mandate to  
audit the claims and draw warrants  
in payment thereof.

One suit was instituted by E. D.  
Shattuck, for his salary as circuit  
judge of the fourth judicial district.  
Another was brought by A. B.  
Crossman, for supplies furnished  
the state penitentiary at the in-  
stance of the superintendent, and  
to the amount of \$20 in value. The  
third was by the Irwin-Hodson  
Company to compel the auditing  
and payment of a claim of \$221.50  
for ruling and binding the assess-  
ment and tax-rolls, at the instance  
of the secretary of state.

Spanish Premier Assassinated by an Italian  
Anarchist.

Madrid, Aug. 8.—Senor Canovas  
del Castillo, the prime minister of  
Spain, was assassinated today at  
Santa Agueda by an anarchist.  
The murderer fired three shots,  
two of which struck the premier  
in the head and the other in the  
chest. The wounded man lingered  
unconscious for two hours, and  
died at 3 o'clock this afternoon.  
His wife was by a short distance  
away when he fell.

Santa Agueda is noted for its  
baths. The place is between San  
Sebastian, the summer residence of  
the Spanish court, and Vittoria, the  
capital of the province of Alava,  
about 30 miles south of Bilbao.

The premier went there last  
Thursday to take a three weeks'  
course of the baths, after which he  
expected to return to San Sebastian  
to see United States Minister Wood-  
ford, when that gentleman would  
be officially received by the queen-  
regent.

The assassin was immediately  
arrested. He is a Neapolitan, and  
gives the name of Rinaldi, but it  
is believed his real name is Angelo  
Angelo Gulli.

The murderer declared he killed  
Canovas in accomplishment of a  
"just vengeance" and as the out-  
come of a conspiracy. He is  
believed to have arrived at Santa  
Agueda the same day as the premier,  
and was frequently seen lurking in  
the passage of the bathing estab-  
lishment in a suspicious manner.

There has been in session in  
Brussels a congress to consider  
the Sunday question. Among its  
conclusions is one to the effect  
that there are few industries in the  
country to which the principle of  
Sunday rest cannot be practically  
applied. It has, therefore, decided  
that the different administrations,  
especially of the railways, be ap-  
proached with a view to securing  
the largest measure possible of  
Sunday rest for all engaged in  
transport service.
