Ex-Governor Waite on Anarchists.
Imposition and Ignorance.

"Anarchist means without law. An anarchist is one who acts contrary to laws. I deny that I belong to that class."
"There are the bankers. They are the leading anarchists of the country. These bankers know that the constitution of the United States says unequivocally that congress shall coin the money of the country. They know, too, that the supreme court of the United States decided in 1884 that greenbacks were issued under the clause of the constitution authorizing congress to issue money; that it is money, and that it fills the requirement of a circulating medium of exchange. Despite this, national banks issue their own notes, which are of the nature of interest-drawing loans, in violation of law."
"The railroad companies are anarchists. The courts have decided that railroads are common carriers, and that common carriers may not discriminate against any class of customers. If you were to ride in a stage coach the same distance a fellow traveler did, the driver would have no right to charge you \$1.50 and the other \$1. That is a parallel case. Yet the railroad companies do discriminate in the granting of rebates and by other unjust methods."
"The courts of the United States are anarchists. The constitution of our country, from which they derive their authority, says in substance that there shall be no arrests without warrants, and no trials without juries. Yet there are trials without juries and arrests without warrants. Congress is an anarchistic body. Its action in arranging for an international monetary conference proves this. It asks foreign powers, that are controlled by the gold power, to hold a conference to decide whether the United States may adopt bimetalism."
"The biggest anarchist this country ever held was Grover Cleveland, who sent an army into Illinois without a call from the governor or legislature of that state. The constitution says that troops shall not be sent into a state unless a call has been made by the legislature, or, if that be not in session, by the governor. Yet this man sent troops uncalled for into Chicago when they were neither wanted nor needed."

We're not at home in etiquette; we do not talk by rule—sollar round the handle of a chaura."
Ed. Herald: As an exhibition of perversity and unlawful seizure of the public highway—a monumental picture of greed and grab—the booms in the Isthmus slough, Coos Bay, stand unequalled. Fellow-citizens, ye who have leisure to devote to an inspection of this highway robbery, go there and be convinced that the case has not been exaggerated. It is a suitable object for contempt and devastation, and there would be nothing unlawful in treating it as an illegal imposition on the public privilege of unobstructed progress through a navigable stream.
Another monument to the imposition of this government is the fact that it cannot or will not compel the removal of the crib which obstructs navigation in Coos Bay. This is an infamous structure; and, at its inception, an attempt was made to "beat" labor by persuading the men who supplied the piles to wait for their pay until the piles were delivered in San Francisco. If they had been fools and so awaited, when would they have been paid? Echo answers—When?
Coos Bay has been, and is yet, a hotbed wherein has flourished a transient lot of dead-beat contractors, bogus coal experts, et id genus omne.
With an abundant supply of labor, the efforts of this class of bilks have met with some success, because they never paid the laborer if it could be avoided; and if suits were instituted, the laborer suffered in the end.
The coal industry has received several set-backs in Coos county through entrusting its manipulation to the hands of ignorance. While not claiming to be an expert, I am familiar with the working of coal mines during a long period; and I am conversant also with the theories of the coal measures. From that standpoint, I have studied the progress of the Beaver Hill coal mine, and have witnessed the folly of excluding men from working in that mine, at its inception, who were practical coal miners in Coos county coal. Failing success by importing colored men from the eastern states, the manager has had to employ (been compelled to, would be more correct) practical miners and an expert boss in Coos county coal. In fact, he stands unequalled in that line on Coos Bay.

Capitalists in California who have invested in coal in Coos county have been unfortunate in placing the control of their mines in the hands of incompetent men who knew no more about coal than enabled them to take a shovel and handle some of it. With few exceptions, and they have been at Henryville, principally, and some at Newport, an ignoramus has had control, and his bullheaded methods have been supreme—defying all corrections, the consequence being a prodigality of money and material and the final failure of the mine. A practical mining engineer should always have supreme control and not be subjected to the whims of an imbecile in coal mining.
There are men around Marshfield who are perpetually praising their coal claims, and deprecating the bad breaks in the coal claims of others. The disease that afflicts that class of idiots is extreme selfishness; they develop nothing but their own assninity, as the coal measures of Coos county are all breaks.

Appeal to Reason: Allegheny county, Penn., has had 13 murders and 58 suicides during the first seven months of this year! And this is one of the results of the present reign of monopoly which is coiling itself about the people, and turn which way they will they meet this deadly enemy, and in despair, not knowing how to fight it they kill themselves to get out of their misery. Governor Lord has appointed W. W. Baker, of Portland, state dairy and food commissioner, "vice H. B. Luce, term expired," and Albert I. Wagner, of Salem, member of the state board of railroad commissioners, "vice H. B. Compton, term expired." It is understood that these appointments will result in bringing before the courts the status of officials who were chosen by the legislature of 1893 and are still holding the places. Undoubtedly General Compton and Mr. Luce will dissent from the statement that their terms have "expired," and it seems equally probable that the men named to succeed them will insist that they are lawfully in office. Mr. Wagner has received his commission and filed his bond, which has been accepted.

James S. Parsons, the fugitive president of the Continental Life Insurance Company, of Hartford, Conn., has returned after 10 years. He is financially broke and stricken with a fatal disease. He was hunted out of the United States by officers of the law, and returns in the hope that he may breathe his last in his own home. State Insurance Commissioner Fyler began the prosecution against him in 1887. It was believed that Parsons' defalcation amounted to between \$100,000 and \$150,000 though what he had done with the money was a mystery.

Mrs. Sally Batchelder, of Penbody, Mass., celebrated the 103d anniversary of her birth last week. She was born in Chichester, N. H., and was the third of a family of fourteen children, several of whom lived to be more than 90 years of age. Her maiden name was Sally King, and when 27 years old was married to Andrew Batchelder, of London, N. H. With the exception of impaired hearing, she retains all of her faculties to a remarkable degree. She says she remembers distinctly the day on which Washington died.

A personal in a Boston paper recently read as follows: "To Philanthropist—I am a working woman; will some one buy and hold for me two shares of sugar stock, and allow me to pay in monthly installments?" Sugar stock was \$108 a share when she inserted her little ad. It sold the other day at \$146. If she got a favorable reply she would have netted \$78 profit on the two shares.
