J. J. Stanley and family returned last evening from their drive down the coast into California, thence via Jacksonville and Roseburg home. Had a pleasant trip.

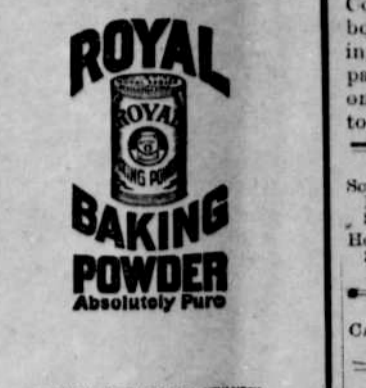
Prof. Kinnicut, one of the most popular educators in Coos county, will open his school at Riverton on Monday, October 4. See advertised rates, etc.
