Dora, Nov. 22.—Our good county roads are no more until next May or June. There have been many mistakes made in locating roads in some parts of the county. Many short hills could be avoided if proper care had been used in laying out and making roads. Many hills are pulled up only to go down again, and then up another and down, which could easily and cheaply have been put on a level grade. The present county court has adopted good rules in regard to the grades being made in laying out new roads, for many old roads have grades from 18 to 25 inches to the rod, where 12 to 16 could have been made with the same work; also where a piece of bad road now exists, if as the present court now instructs the supervisor to put permanent work on said road it would not have to be repaired every year. The farmers need winter roads to move produce over when prices are best.
