Proceedings of Populist State Central
Committee.

Ed. HERALD: The state central
committee of the People's party at
its meeting in Portland, January 19,
1898, W. S. U'Ren was selected as
secretary, and Charles H. Fitch his
assistant. On calling the roll of
counties the following were found
to be present:

Stakeley, H. Denlinger, proxy; Lake

Lane—J. Sutherland, W. S. U'Ren,
proxy; Linn—R. C. Neal; Marion—
K. L. Hibbard; Multnomah—A. P.
Nelson; Polk—T. V. B. Embree, W. S.
U'Ren, proxy; Sherman—C. P. King,
Umatilla—Nathan Pierce, R. M.
O'Brien, proxy; Union—J. E. Reynolds,
J. H. Chandler, proxy; Wash-
ington, G. W. Kelly; Wasco—C. L.

Yamhill—W. H. Kirkwood.

The following counties were not
represented: Curry, Crook, Doug-
lass, Gilliam, Malheur, Morrow and
Tillamook.
J. C. Luce, of Grant; J. W. Jory,
of Marion, and J. W. Marksburg,
of Jackson, national committeemen,
were present; and J. W. Marksburg,
of Jackson, was represented by S. H.
Holt, who held his proxy.
Moved by C. L. Morse, seconded
by K. L. Hibbard, that the central
committee endorse the action of the
executive committee as to time of
holding the state convention. W. S.
U'Ren offered a substitute, seconded
by H. Denlinger, fixing February
23d as the date of the convention.
Substitute lost; ayes 8, noes 19.
Original motion carried, and date of
state convention fixed for March
23d.

On motion of C. L. Morse, action
of executive committee selecting
Portland as the place of holding
state convention approved.
Moved by W. S. U'Ren, seconded
by S. B. Smith, that the state com-
mittee issue the following address:
"The state central committee recom-
mends to the People's party that
they instruct their delegates from
precincts to county conventions, and
delegates from county conventions
to the state convention, for or
against fusion with the Democratic
organization, and if in favor of
fusion, then on what platform and

nominated eleven pronounced gold
men and only five free silver men.
The Maryland Democrat platform
last year omitted all reference to
the ratio in demanding free coinage
of silver. The Democrats have had
ample power in congress many times
to enact a free coinage law and
every time have failed or refused to
do so. In Ohio last year in the
legislative districts of the Northwest
Reserve, where there are many
Populists, there was fusion, the
Democrats receiving the nomina-
tions for state senator and the Pop-
ulists for representatives. In every
case the Populists were defeated
while the Democrats in most cases
were elected. In Kansas last year
there was fusion in many of the
counties on county officers with the
same result, Democrats and Re-
publicans elected and Populists de-
feated.

"Recall if you can any case where
any great reform has been carried
out by a fusion ticket of two or
more parties on different platforms
supported by different party organ-
izations? While fusion was success-
ful in 1896 in Idaho and Washing-
ton, in the former states a Gold
Standard Republican vote was re-
quired to elect the Populist senator,
while in the latter state the senator
elected by the fusionists announced
his conversion to People's party
principles after the legislature was
elected and known to be Populist
on joint ballot.

"Direct legislation by the people
through the Initiative and Referen-
dum is one of the fundamental
principles of our party, but so far
as this committee can see, no Demo-
cratic state platform in the United
States declared for it either in 1896
or 1897, while the platform commit-
tee of the national convention re-
fused to accept such a plank even
from Mr. Bryan. So far as we know
Mr. Bryan has never said a word in
favor of direct legislation since the
Chicago convention in 1896. Re-
member that as between Republi-
cans and Democratic party organ-
izations our people have always
maintained that there was no differ-
ence. Most of the men who were
in control of the Democratic or-
ganization in Oregon in the June
and November campaigns of 1896
still hold their positions. We ask
the men of Oregon if it is possible
for the leading men of a party to
so prostitute the principles and
organization of the party for office
only, and yet retain the confidence
and support of the honest rank and
file of their own voters after the
facts are known? Is it possible for
an organization to be controlled to
command the respect and confidence
of any man who is guided in his
political action by devotion to jus-
tice, truth and honesty? Can we
as Populists consistently stand be-
fore the people after the Democratic
record above given, county, state
and national, and declare this party
to be unworthy of the people's con-
fidence? If we can, what reason is
there for the existence of the Peo-
ple's party as a separate organiza-
tion?"

"Motion to refer to a committee
composed of the chairmen from the
counties named, and to indefinitely
postpone, were lost and then
Mr. O'Brien of Umatilla moved the
following substitute:
"Resolved, That we, the state
central committee of the People's
party of the state of Oregon, recom-
mend to the various county con-
ventions of the People's party
throughout the state that they in-
struct their delegates to the People's
party state convention as to whether
they should favor a fusion or union
or co-operation or alliance of forces
with the Democratic and Silver Re-
publican parties, or either or both of
them, and upon what principles or
conditions they may favor such union
if any.

This was vigorously discussed,
and the substitute adopted. U'Ren
held most of the proxies but en-
gaged that he thought it hardly
right to vote them on this question,
therefore no proxies were voted.
The substitute was adopted, several
members declining to vote.
Ayes—W. R. King, J. W. Ingall,
S. B. Smith, O. P. King, F. M. O'Brien,
J. H. Chandler, G. W. Kelly, C. L. Morse,
W. H. Kirkwood.
Noes—W. S. U'Ren, S. H. Holt, H.
Denlinger, E. C. Neal, J. A. French,
J. W. Jory.
All those voting against the sub-
stitute explained that they did so
because they favored the address in
place of which the substitute was
offered.

A resolution of thanks to the
Women's Club of Portland for al-
lowing the committee the use of
the hall in the evening was unani-
mously adopted. Mrs. McKinney
of Portland addressed the commit-
tee on the advantage of organizing
Women's Populist Clubs in the
coming campaign. Mrs. McKin-
ney's suggestion was unanimously
adopted, and county and precinct
chairmen are urged to provide for
such organizations.

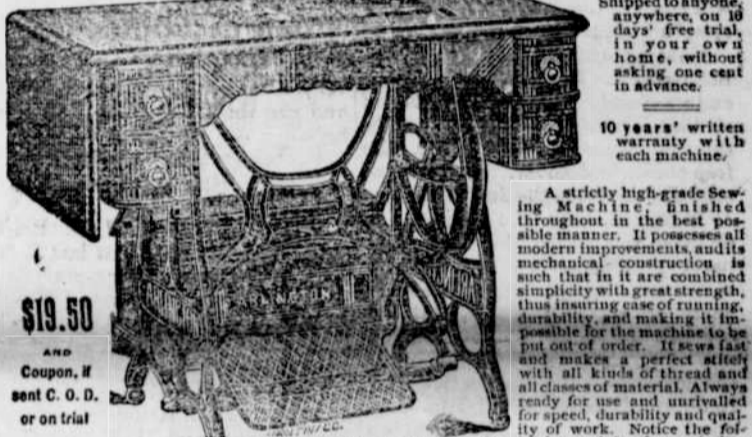
