At first he denied his identity, saying that his name was Frank Smith, but later admitted that he was the man wanted. He says he was in the employ of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern railroad for three years as agent at Marshfield. He claims to be innocent of the charges against him, and says he was only waiting here for money from his folks, who reside in San Diego, to enable him to return to Oregon.

Annual School Meeting.

The annual school meeting of this district was held at the public school building yesterday, as per call, which was largely attended and very harmonious.

The board of directors occupied their seats on the platform—Messrs W. S. Perry and Chas. Collier to the left, District Clerk Boutell at the desk, and Chairman J. S. McEwen on the right.

At a few minutes after the hour of 2 o'clock, the chairman called the meeting to order and announced the order of business—first, the reading of the official call; second, the reading of the last annual minutes; third, the reading of the minutes of special meetings; fourth, the clerk's annual census report; fifth, the financial report. Each of these were in turn approved, without correction or amendment and without a dissenting vote. These were read in detail, proving both interesting and a very prosperous and beneficial school year.

The clerk's census enumeration showed as follows:

Total enrollment.....298.

This is an increase of two over last year.

There are 230 legal voters for school purposes in the district.

There has been paid on the school block the sum of \$869.72.

Nominations for one director for the term of 3 years, vice J. S. McEwen, term expired, was next in order.

Mr. McEwen was nominated and re-elected without opposition, the clerk being instructed to cast the vote.

District Clerk Boutell was nominated and re-elected also without opposition.

The meeting then adjourned.

THE SCHOOL BOARD MET

At the adjournment of the district meeting, W. S. Perry assumed the chairmanship, and J. S. McEwen was sworn in. There being no other business, the board adjourned.
