Obituary. Fairview, July 8.—Edward Neely was born in Pike county, Ill., Nov. 23, 1834, and died at his home near Fairview July 4, 1898.

In 1852 he crossed the plains and settled in Lane county, near Eugene. Later he moved to Josephine county and lived there and in Douglas county until the fall of 1874, when he came to Coos county and located the home place where he died.

In Sept. 1861 he was married to Zilpha E. Mays, who survives him. Five children were the result of this union, of whom two, Willie and Lee, are now living, two having died in infancy and one, John C. Neely, about four years ago.

In 1880 deceased united with the Christian church, of which body he remained a member, faithful unto death. By his death is lost a loving husband, a kind father and a good neighbor.

Though he had been sick for about seven months, and for the last two months his sufferings have been intense, yet his faith in Christ did not waver and his oft-expressed wish was, to die and be at rest.

On July 5 a large number of sorrowing friends followed the loved remains to the Barton Prairie cemetery, where they were laid away, to rest in peace until the judgment day. F. W. B.

A Canadian Armed Force Visits. State Insane Asylum Report.

Seattle, July 4.—A feature of today's celebration was the participation of a regiment of Canadian militia, under the command of Col. Edwin Gaylor Prior, and about 1000 citizens from Vancouver and Victoria, B. C.

The Canadian troops, numbering 350, occupied the place of honor in the procession, which passed along the streets profusely decorated with British and American flags. Their bands played the "Red, White and Blue" and other American airs. It was the first time since 1814 that a British armed force had invaded American soil, and the ovation tendered it was as spontaneous as it was enthusiastic.
