Illiterate and Pauperized.

The Chicago Times-Herald has an article on women in Spain, by a man who resided there several years, from which the following is an extract:

"It appears from an official document that but 2,636,615 Spanish women can read or write. This fraction is almost as big as the male army that knows its own language. It is a pitiful showing, but it is only the beginning of female wretchedness. The municipalities list 51,946 professional beggars who wear petticoats. Then there are 828,531 women who earn their living by working in the farm fields. There are 319,606 women rated as day servants who get but little more than board and shelter for their work, and in all the dying monarchy there are but 719,000 girls in the schools of any kind, public or private. There are twice as many mendicants as males. The census shows that 6,764,406 women have neither professions nor trades, and are altogether dependent upon charity, the possibility of getting married, or hard labor at starvation wages. The same lamentable condition of Spanish women is shown by a glance at another side of her life. The kingdom has but 74 women classed as literary writers. There are but 78 women physicians in the mother country and all the provinces. The women school teachers number only 14,490, as compared with 24,612 men, but this does not include the nuns, who are classed by themselves, and number 28,549."

A Good Definition.

The word "plutocrat" does not necessarily mean a rich man. It is a strange fact that a vast majority of plutocrats are poor men—financially as well as morally poor—while many wealthy people are the most genuine of democrats. A plutocrat is one who looks upon wealth as a warrant of respectability and with the right of industrial and political authority, and of government of, by and for the rich. The toadies to wealth, the caterers to monopoly government, and the blind, unthinking partisan who votes and works for the party with a record adverse to the popular interest is the meanest, most contemptible and most dangerous plutocrat, though not worth a dollar.—Mound City, Kan., Standard.

Thrones Are Tottering.

The thrones of the world are tottering, and kings are feeling insecure, says the Flaming Sword. Why should they? There are more battleships to day than ever before; the armaments are complete, manned with a great soldiery—what should they fear? But the forces are not solely those of powder and dynamite. Special War News Bulletins.

SANTIAGO UNDER FIRE OF COM. SCHLEY.

Brooklyn, Indiana and Texas Bombaraded the City for an Hour by Request of General Shafter.

On board Associated Press Dispatch boat Dandy, off Aguadores, Cuba, July 10, via Kingston, July 11.—(Copyright, 1898, by the Associated Press.)—The Brooklyn, Indiana and Texas, under Commodore Schley, began the bombardment of the city of Santiago at 5:10 o'clock this afternoon in obedience to a request from General Shafter conveyed by signal from shore. The warships lined up from east to west, a quarter of a mile from shore, and fired over the limestone cliffs that came down to the sea and hid the city, five miles distant. The bombardment continued one hour.

ACTUAL BOMBARDMENT BEGAN TODAY.

Washington, July 11.—A cablegram from General Shafter was received at the war department over night stating that the actual bombardment of Santiago would begin today. It appears that the affair of Sunday was only a preliminary artillery skirmish.

The following was received at 10:30 a. m.: "The navy has promised after the bombardment to get in close to the harbor with some of their light-draft boats. If the bombardment (tomorrow) is not quickly conclusive they will make the attempt. As soon as Henry's reinforcements arrive we will surround the town and can knock it to pieces with our light guns."

Twenty-three minutes later the following was received: "My plans for tomorrow are to keep up the bombardment of the trenches and city and complete the investment on the northwest by the troops which have just arrived at Siboney, one regiment of which has reached me."

Soon after noon the following was received: "I regret to report that Captain Rowell, second officer, was killed late yesterday afternoon."

CAMARA'S FLEET AGAIN ON THE HOME STRETCH.

Port Said, July 11.—All the warships of Camara's fleet have sailed for Spain.

Messina, Sicily, July 11.—The Spanish torpedo-boat destroyers sailed for home this morning.

MISERABLE REFUGEES.

At El Caney there are 10,000 miserable refugees from Santiago, old men and old women, whom the Spanish have permitted to go to our lines to get food. The plight of these helpless people is heartrending. The Americans are doing all they can for them.

General Corbin received today a revised and corrected report of the casualties before Santiago July 1, 2 and 3. It slightly increases the number killed and wounded, as given in the first report, and is as follows:

Killed, 28 officers, 208 men.
Wounded, 80 officers, 1023 men.
Missing, 81.
Total, 1595.

General Shafter is of the opinion that the number of missing will be reduced somewhat.

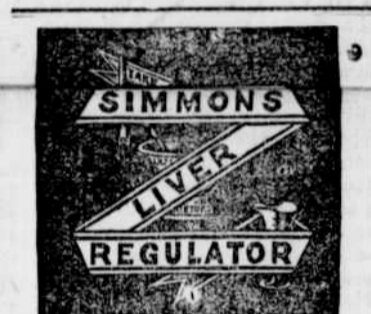

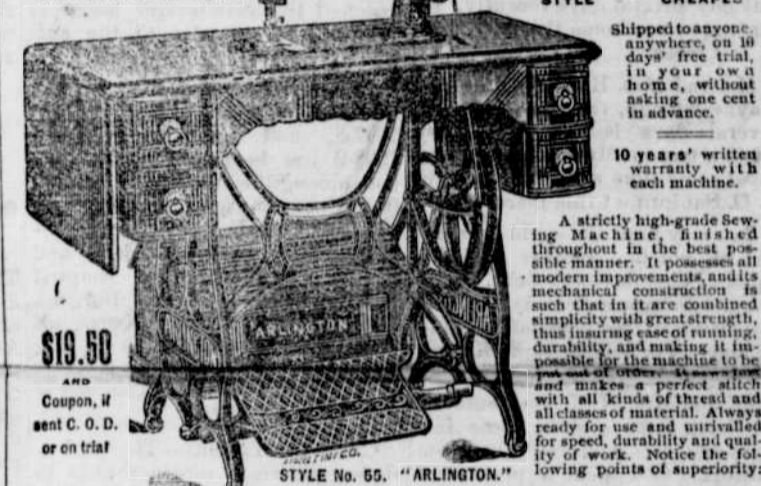
