The school board and contractors for the new schoolhouse, L. H. Morgan and J. A. Collier, after closing the contract for the new building last Friday, went out with Architect Burggraf and laid off the site for the building. Coquille City will have—no unforeseen mishap or hindrance occurring—a school building of which all our citizens will be proud, and which for beauty of proportions, convenience of arrangement, eligibility of site and honesty of construction will be a model, not excelled even in towns more pretentious of wealth and enterprise.

Prof. W. D. Reedy, the teacher at Mellacans, on the bay, was brought to the county seat by City Marshal Lennon, of Empire, last Saturday and delivered his bond in the sum of \$1000 to Sheriff Gage, which was approved and the prisoner released. Reedy and the marshal at once returned to the bay, having been driven over by liveryman James S. Hayes. Reedy is charged with the crime of rape upon the person of a girl named Florence Irving. The hearing was held before Justice Turpen, at Empire, and four witnesses testified for the prosecution. Reedy was held to appear before the grand jury, and has given bond as noted above. It is said he could have given \$10,000 if it had been required.

G. G. Swan, of the Dora community, was in town on business last Saturday. The North Fork section is very prosperous in many lines, especially in general crops, conditioned that glazing is a success. Campmeetings are the rage. The United Brethren were to conclude with last Sunday night's services. It was held at Jack Wood's place, about one mile above the Fox bridge. A large number were to have been baptized Sunday. The attendance and interest were very good. Elders Holt and Chase, of the Mormon faith, have pitched their tent at Dora for a brief season. The Seventh Day Adventists will begin a campmeeting at Bennett's grove, Gravel Ford, tomorrow, July 27th, and continue till August 7th. They will spread a large circular tent for the services, which will be conducted by Elder H. W. Decker, president of the North Pacific conference, Elder D. F. Fero of Portland, and others, able and popular ministers of that faith and both of the named well known here.

The steamer Miami, chartered for this place from Yaquina bay with Willamette valley flour, was held by the inspectors to need repairs and hence was not permitted to come. The flour supply however, has arrived and all our merchant have stocked up heavily with that staple and other goods.

Mrs. Dr. Culin and two children started to visit her parents and friends at Santa Rosa, Cal., yesterday, taking the steamer at Empire. Mrs. Gilbert, of San Francisco, who has spent a month or two here, returned to her home also, with her two children. The lady had been detained here by the serious sickness of her little girl.

The new receiver of the Beaver Hill Co., W. W. Catlin, was expected yesterday. Mr. C. will doubtless have authority to open the store and conduct the business of the company in the interest of the concern till the litigation is terminated. The fact that such legal ability as Gov. Lord, ex-Senator Dolph, Joe Simon et al. were knocked out in the first and all rounds of the contest—well, it is a surprise to some, but shouldn't be to anybody. There is more to follow.

Fire at Marshfield.

A destructive blaze took place at Marshfield about midnight last Thursday night. A blaze was observed issuing from John Blumquist's residence, near the heart of the residence part of town, and soon enveloped four other buildings, notwithstanding the earnest work of the fire laddies and many citizens who gave helping hands. Water was scarce, and but for the fact that there was no breeze at that time and a pretty hard shower of rain served the place of the artificial supply, the city appeared to be doomed. The losses were—the dwellings of John Blumquist, Mrs. Wm. Reichart, John Shutter, a house belonging to A. O. Wheeler of this place (occupied by Mr. Maniki) and a dwelling belonging to Andrew O'Conner damaged badly. Other properties were also reported burned or damaged—one belonging to our townsman G. L. Wheeler and occupied by Capt. C. E. Edwards—but any injury received was so slight that they are not counted.

The total loss would reach about \$8000, but Blumquist carried an insurance of \$2700 and O'Conner, \$500. The others, we believe, lost all—Mrs. Reichart about \$1000, John Shutter \$1200, V. Rudna \$800, A. O. Wheeler, \$900.

Trade Connection with Portland. Last Friday's Evening Telegram gave this hint as to a proposition to give us trade opportunities with Portland:

"A petition [to the Chamber of Commerce] from E. H. Habighorst, of Oakland, Cal., asking assistance for establishing a line of vessels between Portland and Coquille, was referred to the transportation committee."

We are glad to note that that organization—the Chamber of Commerce at Portland—has taken on a new lease of life and is now being stirred as never before in the interest of her trade relations, particularly with Oregon. New channels are being opened at great distances—the Klondike section struck just as the trade interests of Portland were being lulled to insinuation, and while it was temporarily a greater stake than the southwestern Oregon trade and all right to "tie to," she had to contend with others and only take part of the traffic.

Later the Hawaiian and Philippine Islands have assumed friendly and enlarged business intercourse with the Pacific coast, and these are attracting rivalry among our several coast cities. Still Portland hasn't wholly neglected us. Our friend E. H. Habighorst, of Oakland, Cal., who is somewhat familiar with this section and its commercial importance, knows that properly our trade belongs to Portland, and that it is not only increasing but a permanent source of benefit and convenience if mutually cultivated.

We hope, despite the attractions afforded by new trade pointers, that the old leads will be developed and worked for what is in them.

Fires at Myrtle Point. Our neighbor on the upper river was visited twice last week by the destroying element, one residence, that of Frank Wyland, at the edge of town, having taken fire about 6 o'clock Thursday evening and totally destroyed, except the removal of the household goods and doors and windows. It was a nice home and the loss falls heavily on Mr. Wyland and family. There was a small insurance.

ANOTHER BLAZE. Friday night, we learn, a large house belonging to Mrs. Jeff Williams caught fire on the roof and was destroyed. We have none of the particulars as to the extent of the loss.

"CAPT." EBERT WAS DISCHARGED. Was Charged With Embezzlement—Had a Hearing and Was Acquitted.

The evening telegram of the 20th says: There is a ruction in company A, Volunteers of America. Captain H. A. Ebert was arrested this afternoon for the alleged embezzlement of \$200.

The complainant is J. W. Dyer, who claims that the accused is misappropriating money and that he will be able to prove it. For some time past, in the evening, a company's people would congregate on Second and Morrison streets, where the accused was the chief exhorter. He is a person of considerable magnetism, and always succeeded in drawing a fair crowd. After talking a while he would use the base drum as a contribution box, upon which he requested that all those wishing to help him in fitting up the refuge home in the North End, under the control of the Volunteers, to place their small donations.

"What you contribute does not go for the payment of salaries or our support, in any way," Captain Ebert would urge. "All this money, every nickel of it, will be used for the fitting up of a Refuge Home, such as to make it attractive to men used to frequenting North End drinking places. This wise the accused is said to have collected \$200, to the best of Lieutenant Dyer's knowledge.

This case was to have been heard by Municipal Judge Hennessy at a late hour this afternoon.

EBERT ACQUITTED. The Evening Telegram of the 23d notes the result of the hearing thus: HE IS NOT GUILTY.

On Wednesday Captain H. A. Ebert, company A, Volunteers of America, a religious organization, was arrested for the alleged embezzlement of \$200, supposed to have been collected at various times during religious street services. The complainant was Lieutenant J. A. Dyer, who now, it seems, was prompted to cause the arrest of his superior officer through pique.

The case was well aired in the municipal court late yesterday afternoon, where a half dozen members of the volunteers were in attendance prepared to vouch for the integrity of the accused. The examination disclosed that Dyer's accusation was based upon nothing more substantial than his personal belief. District Attorney Sewall stated that that was insufficient to establish the captain's guilt and he was discharged.

Runaway Accident.

Mrs. Sheriff Gage and little daughters, Vivian, Leana, Gladdys and baby Bonnie went to Douglas county some days ago to visit Mrs. Gage's mother and other members of the family and friends at Dillard's and vicinity. The party duly reached their destination and in safety, having driven over with Sheriff Gage's team and carriage, the sheriff accompanying as far as Camas Valley. Last Thursday the sheriff received a letter from Mrs. Gage noting a frightful, but luckily not serious, runaway by the team—at least as to fatality or injury to the family. Dr. L. A. Kent, Mrs. Gage's brother, who had resided in Portland for a year or more past, had returned to his place near Dillard's, and Mrs. Gage took the children in the carriage with her and drove on a visit to her brother's. At a point some distance on the road a line broke, from which Mrs. G. lost control of the team, but which as yet was going leisurely and without fright. Mrs. G. then got out of the carriage, and got Vivian and Leana out also, thinking she could control the team and that the little ones would be still safe within the vehicle. She then started to the horses' heads, but the little folks became frightened and screamed and this startled the team, which became unmanageable and started off. The horses ran some distance, when one of them fell and got tangled in the harness. Gladdys and Bonnie were thrown out; the former having her face badly cut, and Bonnie's shoulder was dislocated. One harness had to be cut to pieces to release the team. Mrs. Gage and the older children escaped any bodily injury.

Accident in Smith's Logging Camp. We are sorry to chronicle a painful and serious accident to our young townsman, Hank Benham, which occurred last Saturday at Smith's camp, near Arago. We have not the particulars, because the camp is near to Myrtle Point and the victim was taken there for treatment except the fact that a logging truck passed over and crushed one of Hank's feet very badly. It was first reported that one ankle had been broken and the other foot badly bruised, but later information is to the effect that but one foot was crushed and torn, but that was very bad and necessitated many stitches.
