## OF INTEREST TO THE PEOPLE.

### Assessment Robberies.

The Examiner states that the Market Street Railway Company is assessed at \$6,379,100 personals and franchise, and for \$7,500,000 altogether, the difference being real estate; yet two years ago the grand jury, by actual sale of bonds and stocks, that the market value of the property was \$19,325,000, and stocks that were then sold for \$46 are now worth \$52.50, raising the value to nearly \$21,000,000. So far its position is correct. Yet it holds that the assessment should be on only \$14,700,000. Why should it be reduced at all from the full value? Where is the law for assessing at 60, 75 or any other percent below actual values? Can any one point out such a law? If not, why is the assumption made?—S. F. Star.

**S. F. Star:** If General Garcia was treated as he claims to have been in the matter of the surrender of Santiago, he has righteous cause for complaint. He should have been present and shared in all the honors. Men who have fought like he and his soldiers did, do not like to be, and should not be ignored in the hour of triumph. "Honor to whom honor is due!" Honor to Shafter, but honor to Garcia, too!—one the proud commander of the American forces, the other the chief-tain of the beggarly but brave Cubans, who, in rags and tatters, fought side by side with our troops for freedom.

**Star:** Admiral Sampson may withhold credit from Schley for demolishing Cervera's fleet, but the American nation will not. Sampson might, we believe would, have acquitted himself equally as well as Schley if he had been there, but his misfortune is that he wasn't. To Schley, then, and the captains of the ships of his fleet, and to the men, down to the most menial stoker, be the "honor and glory, forever and ever."

### Some Pension News.

A report of the commissioner of pensions shows that there are in Oregon 4669 pensioners, and in Washington 5124. The amount of money paid in Oregon is \$609,518 a year, and in Washington, \$727,500.

There are some very large pensions paid by the United States. Two pensioners receive \$5000 a year each. They are Mrs. Grant and Mrs. Garfield, widows of Presidents Grant and Garfield. Mrs. Sheridan, widow of General Philip H. Sheridan, has the next largest pension, receiving \$2500 a year. Four women receive \$2000 a year each. They are Mrs. Logan, widow of General John A. Logan; Mrs. Blair, widow of Gen. Frank P. Blair; Mrs. Fremont, widow of General John C. Fremont, and Mrs. McClellan. Twenty widows receive a pension of \$100 a month each. They are Eliza B. Anderson, widow of General Robert Anderson, General Nathaniel P. Banks; Florida N. Casey, widow of General Silas Casey; Frances Corse, widow of General John M. Corse; Elizabeth C. Coster, widow of General George A. Custer; Mary Doubleday, widow of General Abner Doubleday; Matilda Gresham, widow of General Walter Q. Gresham; Sallie D. Harttraff, widow of General John F. Harttraff; Leonora V. Kilpatrick, widow of General George J. Kilpatrick; Betsey D. Mower, widow of Colonel Joseph Mower; Mary Heap Nicholson, widow of Admiral James W. A. Nicholson; Louise Paul, widow of General Gabriel Paul; Francis A. P. Ricketts, widow of General James B. Ricketts; Maria Rousseau, widow of Gen. Lovell H. Rousseau; Mary A. ### Special War News Bulletins.

#### SPAIN WILL PROPOSE AN ARMISTICE.

London, July 25.—It is announced from Madrid this afternoon that the Spanish government has drawn up a message addressed to the government at Washington proposing an armistice for the purpose of discussing terms upon which peace with the United States can be arranged.

Madrid, July 25.—An official of high rank, in conversation with a correspondent of the Associated Press, said:

"The present government will not institute peace negotiations, but a modified cabinet, headed by Senor Gamazo, minister of public instruction, will conclude the negotiations and then retire, and Polavieja, with a combination, including Senor Silveira and General Campos, will reorganize the government. Everybody thinks Spain should treat directly with the Americans, whose practical good sense will prevail over spread eagerness."

#### WORK OF RESTORING ORDER RETARDED.

New York, July 25.—Dispatches to the World from Santiago say: The Cuban insurgents are retarding the work of the military governor in restoring order in the city. They still are disgruntled because the town is not delivered over to them. The Spaniards are accepting the change of government in Santiago with a good grace. Garcia's forces have left the American camp and gone into the interior. They have been warned, under threat of extreme penalty, not to molest Spanish residents or return to the old system of brigandage.

#### MORE SPANIARDS TO CARRY BACK TO SPAIN.

Santiago de Cuba, July 25.—Captain Rosill arrived here yesterday from Guantanamo to ascertain if General Torral's capitulation was genuine. As a result of his inquiry 1000 Spanish troops at Guanata nana have laid down their arms.

Lieutenant Miles returned from Palma, Soraino and San Luis today, where he received the surrender of 3450 Spanish soldiers under the terms of the capitulation.

They are suffering from various kinds and starvation.

#### GENERAL BROOKE HAS SAILED.

Washington, July 25.—General Brooke, commanding the First army corps, will sail today on the St. Louis from Newport News to join General Miles. The St. Louis will be accompanied on the run by the St. Paul. The war department has no doubt General Miles is now off Porto Rico, and that all his troops will be ashore before the end of the week.

### Smallest and Oddest Republics in the World.

Goust is the smallest Republic as to area, but Tavolara is the smallest republic as to population. Goust is only one mile in area. It is located on the flat top of a mountain in the Pyrenees, between France and Spain, and is recognized by both of those countries. It is governed by a president and a council of twelve. It was established in 1648 and has 130 inhabitants. The president is tax collector, assessor, and judge. Goust has no church, clergyman or cemetery. The people worship in a church outside of their own territory, and the dead bodies are slid down to a cemetery in the valley below. In that valley all the baptisms and marriages are performed. Tavolara is twelve miles northeast of Sardinia. It is an island five miles long by a half mile wide. Its population consists of fifty-five men, women and children. The women go to the polls with the men, and elect every year a president and council of six, all serving without pay. The inhabitants support themselves by fishing and raising fruit and vegetables. The republic has no army and no navy.

An inch of rainfall is equal to 14,500,000 gallons per square mile.

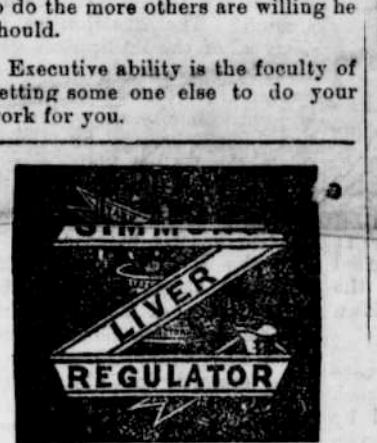

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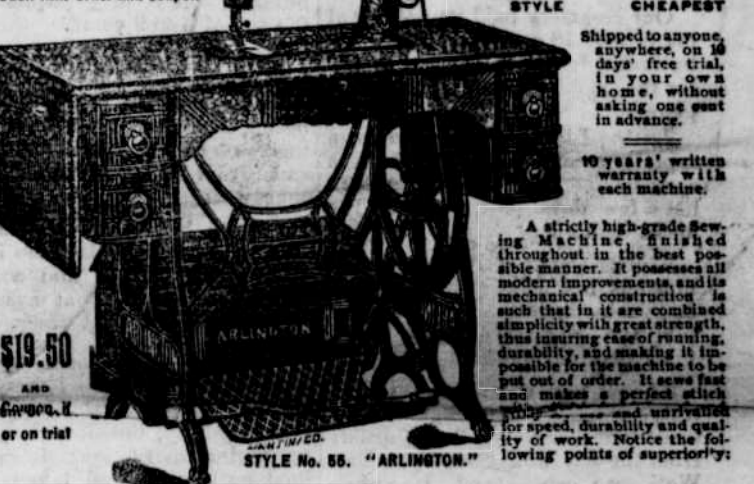
