**ON THE IDENTIFICATION OF MR.
SANFORD.**
Our townsman, R. D. Sanford,
started for Roseburg Thursday
week before last, and just before
leaving he overheard a description
of the alleged thief at Prosper,
which had been telephoned to
Laird's, on the old Coos bay wagon
road, in anticipation of his having
taken the North Fork route. But
on his drive to Roseburg, Mr. San-
ford kept his weather eye open on
the Middle Fork road and discov-
ered the party as he was driving
in the sheep-camp section. He no-
tified officials, but the justice would
not issue a warrant on the infor-
mation. When Mr. Sanford reached
Olalla, knowing still that Brandt
was on the way out, and aware that
he had been relieved of a gun he
had stolen at Fetter's, but still
given his freedom on condition of
"getting out," complaint was made
before Justice Wells and the con-
stable put on track of the offender,
who stationed himself where
Brandt would be sure to pass.
Constable Ireland and young Wells
did not have to wait long, for
Brandt soon came along on horse-
back. The officers held him up
and took charge, after a brief
threatened resistance by Brandt.
On inquiry he admitted having
stolen the horse, and a few min-
utes later Edward Brady came to
hot pursuit for his horse, which
had just disappeared from his
barn a little while before. Of
course, by time of arrival of the
officers and prisoner at Olalla, the
county authorities were notified in
Roseburg, and the prisoner taken
hence and jailed Sunday last week.

number 73406, daily between Rose-
burg and Myrtle Point (over the
Middle Fork route) goes to F. H.
Pickering, of Salt Lake, for \$4210.
Both of these routes are to have
daily service, beginning on October
1st.

The present daily service be-
tween Roseburg and Looking Glass
in charge of T. J. Williams, will
be discontinued when the Roseburg-
Empire route is established, as it
will cover the same ground.

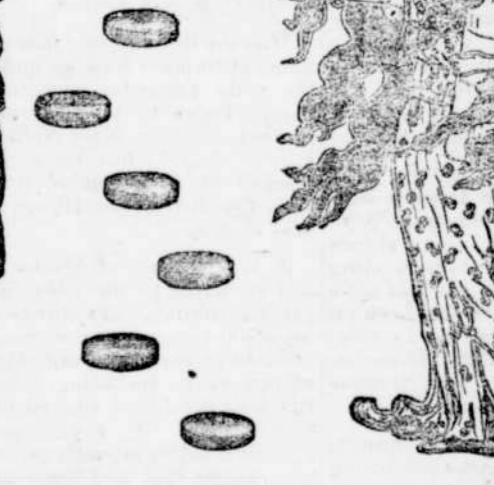
