Institute Program.

McKINLEY, Or., Aug. 23, 1898. The following will serve as an outline of the daily work of the Teachers' Institute, to convene in Myrtle Point, September 19-23:

- Opening, 8:50 to 9:00. Reading, 9:00 to 9:40. Language, 9:40 to 10:20. Recess, 10:20 to 10:35. History, 10:35 to 11:15. Spelling, 11:15 to 12:00.

Writing will alternate with physiology, and other topics will at regular intervals give place to primary work in actual schoolroom practice with a class of children.

This last work will be under the special supervision of Miss Carrie Bentley, of Salem.

State Supt.-elect Ackerman will be the principal instructor, and we are reasonably sure of the assistance of State Superintendent Irwin, both in the daily and the evening exercises. Necessary note books and pencils will be supplied to the teachers free.

The teachers and their friends will entertain the public two evenings during the week with literary exercises, consisting of lectures, recitations and music.

Our hosts, the good people of Myrtle Point, will give the teachers a picnic in the grove on the 21st, unless another day shall be selected as more convenient to them.

On Thursday evening the public will be further treated to a grand free entertainment and reception given by our Myrtle Point friends.

I wish the teachers attending this institute to decide by vote as to where the next annual institute shall be held. Such a course will in my opinion be more satisfactory to all concerned, besides each teacher in exercising an equal voice in its location will doubtless feel the same equal responsibility in the success of the institute.

Should any of the towns of the county wish to offer any special inducements to influence the teachers in their selection of a place for holding next year's institute, such propositions must be presented for consideration by September 23d.
