Coquille River and Coos Bay Harbor improvements.

Following is from Major Fisk's report of the year's improvements on our Coquille and Coos bay harbors: Under contract with Daniel Kern, of Portland, the south jetty at the mouth of the Coquille river was extended 270 feet. Throughout the entire length the jetty is now up to high-tide level. When piles were driven for this jetty, an underlying bedrock was found only four feet below the bottom of the river bed, thus greatly facilitating the work. No work was done on the north jetty, and it is now in such condition that it will probably have to be rebuilt before it can be used. The outer 300 feet have settled considerably, are in much worse condition than other portions.

The Coquille was further improved by having many of its snags removed and numerous dams constructed between Coquille City and Myrtle Point. Between Roberts' landing and Rackleff landing great stretches of dike and other shore protections were constructed, and a channel 50 feet wide excavated through gravel shoals. Previous to these improvements, the Coquille river was almost impassable at low tide, but when operations were completed, river steamers experienced no difficulty in running up stream as far as Roberts' landing.

All of the late operations at the mouth of Coos bay have been confined to the north jetty, which, up to a year ago, had been partially built to a length of 9000 feet. In the past year half of this stretch has been brought up to high tide level. The Coos bay collection district shows a total of \$10,072 in receipts for the last year, and \$105,607 in shipments. Of 359 vessels arriving at the port, 302 were sailing vessels; and against the 1660 incoming passengers were the 1680 who departed.

There has been no change in the proposed dredging of Coos bay harbor, although operations have as yet not taken definite form. A 400-foot half-tide dike was built on the right side of Coos river at Carpenter shoal to prevent the bank from sliding into the channel, and in addition to accomplishing that object has succeeded in securing an additional depth of two feet in the regular channel. At the time operations ceased in Coos river the 50-foot channel which was desired was not completed. While these improvements are being made, the commerce on the stream, they have made it possible to handle commerce more expeditiously and with less difficulty than before.

The Gainesville (Texas) Hesperian publishes a portion of a letter from an old acquaintance and friend of the editor of the HERALD who, with his family, resides in Havana, Cuba, and has for many years. Major Graleeves sent his letter to the U. S. by a Frenchman who was leaving Havana for New York. The man sailed from Sagua le Grande, and paid \$250 for his 43 days' trip. The major says, the letter being dated July 21st: "This city has been blockaded for three months, and all is misery. Provisions are scarce. Bread is 15 cents a pound; bacon, one; lard \$1 a pound; eggs \$2.50 per dozen; beef 40 to 50 cents and very scarce; next come horses and mules; chickens \$1.50 to \$4, and turkeys \$8 to \$10 each. Famine stares many in the face. This morning at 5 o'clock Morro Castle commenced to belch forth her big gun, and it made the city tremble. I thought the Yanks were in sight, sure. I see their ships every day from the roof of my house, passing up and down in front of the city, 6 to 10 miles out. No telling when this war will end, as they intend to fight it out."

People are leaving here all the time. They go to Sagua and take foreign vessels for Mexico or Jamaica.

The Judge and the "Vag"—But they belong to the Same Order.

W. J. Kelly, formerly a variety performer, but now, according to police evidence, without employment, has been acquitted by Judge Hennessy, of the municipal court, on a charge of vagrancy.

Late yesterday afternoon he and J. Rogers were jointly tried. The evidence was to the effect that both were cronies, without visible or invisible means of subsistence. They were arrested and prosecuted by Officers Church and Kitzmiller, two of the most reliable men in the department; and the story related against Rodgers applied with equal force to Kelly.

Yet the latter was acquitted, and the other fined \$100. Judgment in Rogers' case, however, was suspended on condition that he speedily find employment.

When Rogers was arraigned, Monday, on a charge of vagrancy, and before he had time to plead to the charge, Judge Hennessy remarked:

"No, he cannot be a vagrant. He belongs to the same order I do, and I must protect him."—Portland Evening Telegram.
