THE RECORDS SHOW CURES OF Rheumatism

(From the Coos Bay News) The Empire, which arrived Wednesday, took a cargo of coal at the Newport bunker, and a deckload consisting of 150 head of cattle and 74 hogs.

A large whale came up the bay as far as Empire, Friday evening, and another was seen by the crew of the tug at Charleston bay. Whales are frequently seen off the coast, but they rarely come into the harbor.

Louis Dewesse met with an accident in the Newport mine, Saturday. While working in the mine, a quantity of coal fell on him, badly crushing the bones of his left leg. Dr. Tower performed a successful operation, amputating the injured member below the knee.

James Wall was in town from the Umqua, Thursday. We understand that he had been arrested and fined for running his steamer without a pilot's license. This, however, did not mean a tie-up, as he promptly secured Capt. Erickson's services, and the rate war on the Empire-Drain route goes merrily on.

As to County Warrants.

At the Pendleton session, on the 13th inst., the supreme court of Oregon handed down a very important decision bearing upon the validity of warrants issued by counties that have passed the constitutional limit of indebtedness. Under this decision all such warrants except those absolutely necessary, and issued to cover expenses that the county is powerless to prevent, are held to be invalid.

SYNOPSIS OF THE DECISION.

The Municipal Security Company, appellant, vs. Baker county et al., respondents; modified. The avowed purpose of this suit was to relieve certain Baker county warrants, owned and held by plaintiff, from the operation of a decree entered in a suit to which plaintiff was not a party, and by which the county treasurer was enjoined from paying and the sheriff from receiving them in payment of taxes and to restore them to their original condition. The warrants in question were issued to different parties on different accounts. Warrants were issued to one Borman for indexing records; to Chambers for the purchase of a poor farm; to Whitney for work on county books; one to Bernard & Co. for purchase of shelving for records; one to Ferguson for insurance. All were presented to the county treasurer soon after their issuance, and stamped not paid for want of funds. The defendants include many taxpayers, and several defenses were interposed. Among them was the claim that Borman and Whitney warrants were for pretended services, and were never authorized. Another was that liabilities created by the warrants were voluntarily assumed by the county, and that at the date of their issue the county was \$200,000 in debt, of which \$20,000 was voluntarily incurred, therefore unconstitutional and void. The plaintiff alleged that when the warrants were issued taxes had been levied and were collectible to the amount of \$50,000; that much of the county's indebtedness claimed to have been voluntarily incurred and existing at the time the warrants were issued, has since been paid and treated as valid; that the county and defendants have received full value for the warrants; that the whole of the indebtedness created by the warrants was recognized by the commission appointed to determine the appropriate proportion of debt of Baker county which Malheur should assume. That the indebtedness of the county represented by the warrants in controversy was thrust upon it by operation of law is contended by plaintiff and denied by defendants. The defendants also set up the county's constitutional limitation of \$5000. At the time of the issuance of the warrants the court below found the outstanding indebtedness against the county aggregated \$40,535, two small warrants excepted, and that there was indebtedness of \$35,000 when these two warrants which are included in the controversy were issued. Including this voluntary indebtedness, the county's total indebtedness exceeded \$150,000. Held that the limitation of indebtedness had been passed when the warrants were issued; that as to the Bernard & Co. warrants, for shelving; the Ferguson warrant, for insurance; Chambers' warrant for purchase of poor farm, they were not liabilities that the county was powerless to prevent; that the Borman warrants for indexing and platting fall within the constitutional inhibition, and

are void, for further reason that it appears that 33 1/2 per cent was added to warrants for service rendered, an act the county court has no authority to do. The warrants issued to Whitney for bringing up the books that were a year behind and to investigate the books of county officials (held to be necessary services), declared valid and restored to their original condition. Plaintiff is enjoined from enforcing payment of all the others. Opinion by Wolverson, J.
