COOS BAY TRADE SHOULD BE OURS.

San Francisco at Present Has a "Corner" on It.

The Portland Evening Telegram, of the 10th inst., published an interview had with Dr. E. Mings, of Beaver Hill, and "kind of takes a tumble" to statements which the Portland people have had poked at them lo, these many years.

The doctor has not been long resident of our section, but he took in the situation readily, and this is the conclusion as given by the Telegram, including the "wonder why" in its headlines in these words:

"Dr. Mings wonders why Portland does not make some effort to secure its share [of the trade], which is all of it, and which could be had for the taking?"

And the Telegram might have learned further that the Coquille valley trade is quite well reaching after also, after finding out that the Coquille river is a navigable waterway not tributary to the bay, but furnishing its own channel for the extended inland trade of a rich valley, mining and lumber region, 50 miles back from the ocean.

The Telegram says: Dr. E. Mings, formerly of this city, but at present surgeon for the Beaver Hill Coal Company, of Coos county, a corporation in which the Spreckels' of San Francisco, are heavily interested, is among those who believe that Portland is making a big mistake in not reaching out for the Coos bay trade.

He has been in the city during the past few days of business, and in speaking of the commercial importance of this section, said:

"People generally have little idea of what the Coos bay country really is. Portlanders especially must be ignorant of this section, or else this city would have made some efforts to secure Coos bay's trade ere this."

"The lumber and coal resources of Coos bay are apparently inexhaustible. There is also fine agricultural and grazing land to be found there. San Francisco now controls all of this trade. All the lumber and coal taken out goes to San Francisco. San Francisco merchants sell to all of the Coos bay merchants, San Francisco papers supply the news. Portland papers are seldom seen there. In fact, one feels that he is in California, and that Oregon is really another state."

"There is scarcely a merchant in the Coos bay country who would not prefer to trade with Portland had he an opportunity to do so. Portland, however, does not seem to care for this trade."

In speaking of the property of the Beaver Hill Coal Company, which is now in litigation, W. W. Catlin, of this city, having recently been appointed receiver, Dr. Mings states that the mines are at present shut down. The property has been mismanaged, he says, and allowed to lapse into a state of collapse. Several of the tunnels have been permitted to cave in and one of the main shafts was burned out. Over a million dollars have been expended on the property, and it is still considered very valuable.

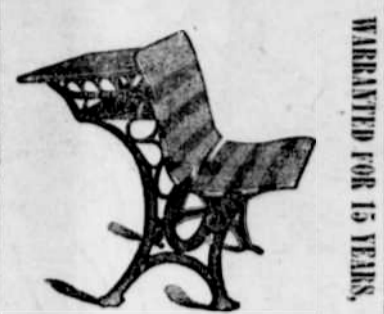
