County Judge's Salary.
Ed. HERALD: At the time you represented Coos county in the legislature, was not there a law passed to reduce the salary of the county judge, and now I see Mr. Harlocker drew two months salary—\$200; that is \$1200 a year, and the law only allows \$800. And that is what Judge Schroeder drew as his salary.

Now will you explain to us if any legislature has since repealed the \$800 salary law? Or, are the taxpayers to pay \$400 a year more than the law allows?

Maybe Mr. Harlocker can explain. TAXPAYER.

In reply to "Taxpayer" we will briefly state the case: In the legislative session of 1893, Hon. J. M. Upton, joint representative from Coos and Curry, January 3, 1893, introduced House Bill No. 169, "A bill for an act to amend an act entitled an act to regulate the salaries of county judges of the state of Oregon," etc. The second reading was on January 16, and it passed without question.

At its third reading in the house, February 3, 1893, the bill passed, yeas, 47; nays, 1.—Mr. Merrill, Republican from Columbia county. There were 12 members absent.

February 17 Speaker Keady announced that he would sign the bill, and did then and there sign it with 15 others.

In the senate the bill also fared well, having the sympathy of members of all parties and almost unanimously receiving their support. Leading attorneys from all over the state favored it—although a Populist measure it was a popular measure also.

The bill was filed in the senate on the 4th day of February and read first time on the 8th, and on motion of Senator Jeff Myers of Linn the rules were suspended, the bill passed its second reading at once: Ayes, 22; nays, none; absent, 8.

February 16 the measure was put on its final passage, and after a few amendments, raising the salary in Josephine county from \$500 to \$600, in Gilliam from \$400 to \$500; in Tillamook from \$300 to \$500; in Lane from \$700 to \$800; and Malheur county to \$500, which were inserted by the representatives of those counties and given unanimous consent, the bill passed: ayes, 25, nays, none; absent, 5.

Next day, the 17th, President Fulton announced that he was about to sign house bill No. 169, and did so.

The act was then filed in the office of the secretary of state on Feb. 22d, having been approved by the governor.

It fixed the salary of the county judge of Coos county at \$800 per annum—the salary before being \$1200.

Judge Watson was in 1891 county judge of Coos county, and had during his tenure accepted the increase in his salary under the law of 1891. He was also county judge in 1893, when the new law was passed, with the very same wording as the former measure, and so unanimously, and with the hearty support of as able attorneys as are in the state, and yet he refused to accept the reduced salary, and went so far as to get an extra-judicial opinion in his support from a firm of lawyers at Portland. All this while, also, the law was accepted in other counties without question.

Judge Schroeder was elected in 1894, and on assuming the position recognized the law as effective and accepted only his \$200 per quarter salary.

Now, after a lapse of four years, without any intervening amendment or modification of the law by the law-making power of the state, Judge Harlocker is credited in the court's proceedings thus, under the heading of salaries of "officers": "L. Harlocker, 2 months' salary as county judge, \$200."

This is the point referred to by our correspondent, "Taxpayer," to which he invites our attention and to which we respond in the above statement of the origin and contents of the law in the case. There is much comment among the people on the subject, and the HERALD will willingly hear from Judge Harlocker on the matter.
