GRAND JURY REPORTED

Ten indictments, defendants' names being unknown, accused of gambling with cards at stud-poker for money on Sept 11, 1898.

FINAL REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY.

TO THE HON. H. L. BENSON, JUDGE: We, the grand jury for the October, 1898, term of the above court submit the following as our final report:

We have examined into the different crimes alleged to have been committed and triable within the jurisdiction of the above court for Coos county, and have returned indictments in all cases in which we thought the evidence would warrant a conviction in the trial court and reported the same as true bills.

In cases in which the evidence did not appear to be sufficient to warrant a conviction in the trial court we have returned indictments endorsed, not a true bill, where the defendants had been held to answer.

We have made an examination of the books of all the county officers and they appear to be neatly kept.

We made a visit to the Poor Farm and find that the same needs a number of improvements, and we suggest to the county court that the storehouse on the farm be repaired at once.

The county jail is extremely cold and the county court should cause a stove to be placed in the same immediately.

We desire to thank Geo. M. Brown, the district attorney, for his aid, efficiency and promptness.

Having completed our labors, we ask to be dismissed.
