Mrs. E. M. Lockhart. Reducing Rates of Interest.

The Oregonian has been publishing pictures of the pioneers of Oregon, in a number of late issues, together with a short biography.

"Mrs. Esther M. Lockhart was born at Ulysses, Tompkins county, N. Y., January 13, 1825. She was next to the youngest in a family of 10 children born to Peter and Elizabeth Selover.

The law which has been signed by the governor, making the fall open season for salmon extend to November 20, instead of closing November 1, on all the waters of Oregon except the Columbia river and its tributaries, was introduced into the senate by Reed of Douglas, and reads as follows:

"Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any persons to take or fish for salmon in the waters of the Nehalem, Tillamook, Nestucca, Salmon, Siletz, Yaquina, Alsea, Siuslaw, Umpqua, Coos bay, Coquille, Sixes, Elk, Chetco, Rogue River, Windchuck, or any of their tributaries, or in any other streams or bays in this state, except the Columbia river and its tributaries, from the 20th day of November until the 20th day of December, or between the 15th day of April and the 1st day of June."
