Capt. W. H. Harris—1850.

In the Oregonian of Tuesday, Oct. 25, 1898, we find a wood cut picture of our Capt. W. H. Harris, and a brief sketch of his life and services as an Oregon pioneer.

Captain W. H. Harris was born January 29, 1823, in Howard county, Missouri. In 1826 he moved to the then wilderness of western Tennessee.

In 1836 with his parents he moved to the Chickasaw and Choctaw nation, which by subsequent treaty became a part of the state of Mississippi. He remained there on the farm till 1846, when war was declared between the United States and Mexico, when he at once enlisted, with the rank of first lieutenant, in Colonel Jeff Davis' regiment, and went to the scene of hostilities by water, arriving in time to take part in the engagement at Monterey. In February following he took part in the capture of Buena Vista by General Taylor. He served until the close of the war, being mustered out at Vicksburg. In 1849, after the discovery of gold in California, he went to California by the way of the Isthmus of Panama. He mined on the American river until September, 1850, when he returned to San Francisco, on his way to Oregon, where he arrived the same year. He settled in Portland, purchasing the property on Front street subsequently occupied by Corbett & Failing, property in the block where the Masonic Temple now stands, and also several lots in various parts of the city.

The county seat was then at Hillsboro, Multnomah county at that time being unorganized. In the summer of 1852, after the discovery of gold in Jackson county, with a party of young men he went to Jacksonville and engaged in mining on Jackson creek. In 1853 he joined a party organized at Jacksonville to prospect and explore that part of the country lying west of the coast range, and in which Coos and Curry counties are now located. After looking the country over as far as Coos Bay the party concluded to locate, and Captain Harris took the first claim in Coos county, where Empire City now stands, in June, 1853, under the donation act. In 1854, with Northrup & Simonds, of Portland, he opened the first coal mine on Coos Bay, which was known as the Eastport mine, and continued mining there until the breaking out of the Rogue River Indian war, when operations at the mine closed, and Captain Harris organized a company, built a fort and remained in the volunteer service until the close of the war. After the war he remained on Coos Bay till 1858, when he was married to Miss Margaret Romanes. Soon afterward he moved to a farm on the South Fork of the Coquille river, six miles south of Myrtle Point, where he has since resided. His wife died in 1877. He has three daughters—Miss Mary Harris, Mrs. J. A. Lehnher and Mrs. T. C. Norris, all of whom reside near Myrtle Point.

Roseburg Review: It looks as if beef cattle would be scarce in Coos county the coming winter and spring. A great many head have been shipped to San Francisco lately, and young stock have also been purchased and driven.

Roseburg Review: Frank Morrison, the genial representative of the Salem Statesman, came out last night from Myrtle Point, having been making a tour of Coos county in the interest of his paper. He tells us that the trip out by stage in the night time is a very rough experience. About midnight near Remote, their vehicle was upset and the three passengers thrown out, fortunately none of them was injured. Mr. Morrison alone was injured with mud. Mrs. W. C. Hildebrand was one of the passengers on the stage, returning home from a visit to Bandon.
