COQUILLE'S NEW SCHOOL-HOUSE.

Contract With Original Contractors Terminated and the Work to Proceed.

The school board of District No. 8, Coquille City, held a meeting last Wednesday evening and took action in the matter of pressing the new school building to completion.

In view of the fact that the original contractors had failed to complete the building and turn it over to the school board by the 1st week in November, according to contract, and that work had been suspended and materials exhausted, the board elected under the contract to terminate the employment of said contractors, as provided in said contract, and proceed themselves to finish the school building.

The board, therefore, adopted a resolution in compliance with article 5 of said contract, and drafted in accordance therewith a formal notice, the chairman of the board, W. S. Perry, and Clerk Bontel, personally serving the same Thursday morning, Nov. 3d, and delivering into the hands of each of the contractors, L. H. Morgan and J. A. Collier, a copy of the notice, and posted one on the school building.

Of course, the result was considerable discussion of the subject by the citizens on as many theories as there were persons to talk about it, but few of them took the trouble to inform themselves of the facts in the case. However, the board awaited the expiration of the time of notice, and on Monday (yesterday) the board met at the HERALD office and proceeded (with Architect Barggraf and J. A. Collier, one of the original contractors, present) to assume the completion of the building, as provided in the contract. Mr. Collier, however, in the time intervening the service of the notice and this meeting of the board, had bought out Mr. Morgan's interest and was prepared to serve the board unhampered.

A resolution was then passed by the board, employing Mr. Collier to continue the work, with power to employ such force of skilled workmen as was necessary to do the work, and under the supervision of the architect and school board, he to receive \$3 per day, and employ to receive not exceeding \$2.50 per day, under the conditions of the contract.

So the work proceeds, and it is the expectation of the board to complete the building within the terms of the contract as to cost and occupy the same for school between the 1st and middle of December.

SPANIARDS REJECT.

Definite Refusal to Give Up the Philippines. More War in View.

Paris, Nov. 4.—The joint session of the peace committee today refused two hours. The Spaniards refused the proposals made by the Americans on Monday last, but negotiations were not broken off.

The commissioners then adjourned until Tuesday next.

The Americans were aware before today's session opened that the Spaniards would decline the proposition made Monday last.

Gaulois today says it has been informed on absolutely reliable authority that Spain will refuse to discuss the unconditional surrender of the Philippines.

The Frondo says: "The claims of the United States on the Philippines are looked upon with disfavor at St. Petersburg. The powers might, in case of the Americans proving too obstinate on this point, be provoked to protest."

Inoculation as a Cure for Inebriety.

Dr. Frederick W. D'Elyyn, of St. Luke's hospital, San Francisco, suggests a theory which if found to be practical will solve the temperance question, and will be a deathblow to the Keeley cure and the liquor trade.

He claims it is possible not only to cure inebriates but to fortify children against the possibility of becoming drunkards by inoculation, and thereby in a few generations make a sober race of people throughout the land.

Dr. D'Elyyn says he has already inoculated persons with marked success with a preparation taken from a horse which had been fed on alcohol until he had become a regular toper.

A number of Portland physicians were shown the claims of the San Francisco doctor today. None of them had given the matter any thought. In fact, it was news to most of them, and few cared to express an opinion on such a question without knowing more about it.

One man was found who was willing to say what he thought about it. That was Dr. J. J. McMicken, who said, after reading the article descriptive of the plan: "I hadn't heard of such a thing before, but I put no faith in it. In fact, I am not much of a believer in vaccination for smallpox, which is simply a disease of filth, and can be better controlled by sanitary measures."

"Just as I think of drunkenness. It must be controlled by fathers and mothers from generation to generation leaning to control their appetites, not only in regard to drinking, but in every way."

"A father or mother may be a glutton and some form of intemperance will very likely crop out in their children. 'What is bred in the bone is born in the flesh.'"

"On the other hand, if parents were moderate in all things in a few generations most children would be moderate."

"I don't think inoculation will ever hinder drunkenness to any extent. But as I said, I am not much of a believer in inoculation for anything."

The American army chaplains recently held Protestant services in Manila, for the first time in the history of the Philippines.

The empress dowager of China has prohibited the publication of newspapers in many provinces of China, and severe punishment has been dealt out to the publishers, and all officials interested in the new reform movement have been replaced by conservatives.

In Eugene last Wednesday Claude Branton, on trial for the murder of John Linn, testified in his own behalf. In brief he charged Courtland Green with the murder of Linn, and claims to be innocent himself. Green had previously testified that Branton did the killing.
