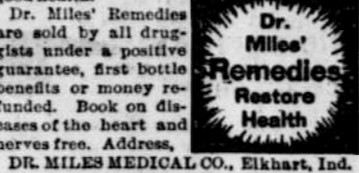

BOLD ROBBERY AT ARAGO.

An Attempt Wednesday Night Failed, But Sunday Night the Robbers Secured \$15,000.

Wednesday night of last week some party visited the store of W. H. Schroeder & Co., at Arago, about 9:30 o'clock, and meeting Peter Crow, an employe and boarder with Mr. Schroeder, at the door, attacked the latter and dealt him several rapid and stunning blows upon the head and arms with a stick of wood or pistol. Mr. Crow soon recovered, though fallen inside the doorway of the storeroom, but only to find the robber had him by the feet and was trying to drag him out. Mr. Crow kicked loose, however, and kicked the door shut in the robber's face and locked it.

Thus disconcerted, the robber seems to have given up on the first round. Mr. Schroeder occupies the rear of the storeroom for a residence, and Mr. Crow sleeps in the building. They soon came to a conclusion as to the occasion of the attack. Mr. Schroeder is treasurer of the Arago Creamery Company and had that day received about \$1600 in silver with which to pay off a month's earnings of the patrons. It was hard to handle and provide a safe place for, and the knowledge of its having been received must have exposed it to the view of the intending robber. However, he failed that time.

Mr. Crow came to town Saturday and among other things had some of his wounds dressed. He thought he had escaped fairly well.

BUT SUNDAY NIGHT, NOV. 6TH, The robber and an accomplice appeared early in the evening and successfully accomplished the job, securing the sum of \$1500. This was before 8 o'clock at night. Willie Schroeder had retired, as yet leaving the door unlocked, while Mr. Crow sat reading. A little later Mr. Crow visited the door, when two parties shoved revolvers in his face—one had two pistols and the other one leveled at him—with orders to be quiet and take them to "the little man"—meaning Willie Schroeder.

With Crow right in front of them and their weapons close to his head he had no choice in the matter, and soon had them in the presence of "the little man." They announced their errand and commanded him to open the safe. This done and the sack in their possession, they ordered Mr. Schroeder to retire and make no noise or they would kill "the big man"—Crow. With Crow in their charge they wended their way from the store to the steamer landing and there they bound and gagged Crow and fastened him down to the track upon which they deliver milk on a car from the boat to the creamery. This accomplished they disappeared. Some little while later Crow made some noise which attracted the attention of Finley Schroeder and Jamie Stauff, who happened to be starting homeward from a call they had been making in the vicinity, and these parties released Crow and accompanied him home.

Now, these are the facts—not fully in detail—as nearly as we could learn them. The sheriff was notified and went out promptly on his still hunt for the robbers.

The money secured was some of Mr. Schroeder's own, some post-office money and the bank creamery money—which Mr. S. tried hard to save by practising a deception upon the robbers, but failed—and was a total of about \$1500.
