Coo's Bay News: There is a good chance to secure a fruit dryer at Marshfield, if those interested in the welfare of the town will assist the enterprise financially. R. A. Graham has offered a two-acre site at the depot and other inducements, and if the citizens do their part, work will commence at once. The establishment of a fruit dryer on the bay means a fair price for all varieties and sizes of apples, and it is the intention of Mr. Burleson, one of the partners in the enterprise, to put up vegetables as well as fruit. It means a home market for apples, potatoes, etc., and will be the means of distributing considerable money in this section annually.

C. D. McFarlin, of North slough, received a bronze medal for the second best exhibit of cranberries at the Portland exposition.

The Arcata, besides her usual cargo of coal, took 2300 boxes of apples, 45 boxes of butter and 20 boxes of cheese, from the warehouse, this trip.

The Newport mine has been handicapped of late, on account of a scarcity of miners. An improvement, however, is noticeable at present, and the output is now about 200 tons per day.

Abbie Tutbey, the 5-year-old son of G. W. Tribbey, of South Marshfield, was kicked by a horse, while playing on the commons near the family residence, Saturday afternoon. The horse kicked the boy in the face, and cutting his nose and through the upper lip to the bone. Dr. Horsfall was called and dressed the wound.

Tom Coke commenced this morning on a sub-contract carrying the mail between Fairview and Empire. He has moved his family to East Marshfield. From now on the mail will arrive and depart via East Marshfield instead of Coo's City, as heretofore.

Grant Beale and Will Holland returned to the bay on the last trip of the Alliance. Since leaving here last winter, they put in most of their time at Lake Bennett, Alaska, where they were engaged in building boats. They intend returning to Lake Bennett in February.

Bob Hinman's Parson was Too Late. Friday afternoon, Oct. 29th, Governor Lord commuted the sentence against Robert Hinman, of Dillard, Douglas county, upon recommendation of Superintendent A. N. Gilbert, and sent him home to die.

Hinman was sent to the penitentiary July 9, 1897, for assault with a dangerous weapon committed upon a deputy sheriff. He was indicted for resisting an officer and sent to the penitentiary for five years for assault with a dangerous weapon. Soon after he was sent to the prison the malady of consumption made its ravages on him and this rapidly developed until it was seen that he could not live. His sentence was commuted, and in company with his mother he started for his home, but strength failed him and he was taken to the Salem hospital where, in a few hours, he breathed his last.

The remains were removed to the undertaking parlors of A. M. Clough, from whence they will be shipped to Myrtle Creek this evening. Pardon came too late for Robert Hinman to see the old homestead.

No Foolishness. Judge Hamilton permits no foolishness in his court, and along that line he is going to save the taxpayers of Lane county several hundred dollars. He sits down hard on the attorneys, but even they admit that he is right in his decisions. In the Branton murder case there is plainly a desire on the part of the defense to stave the case off as long as possible. There are nearly fifty witnesses in the city who have been summoned for this particular case. Over a dozen of them reside in eastern Oregon. The case will be an expensive one, and should it be continued over to another term, the expense would be greatly increased. It seems, however, to be the judge's purpose to thwart this plan, and if he succeeds it will be a big saving to the county.—Eugene Register.

Roseburg Plaindealer: While picking apples Saturday afternoon, J. Johnston, a United Brethren minister, fell from a ladder about 12 feet. He broke his arms at the wrists and was seriously bruised about the head and face. Mr. Johnston is over 70 years of age. He is a veteran of the civil war.

Taylor McHargue, who has crossed the plains 20 times, and who left Brownsville about six weeks ago for Missouri, returned to that place Monday evening. The snow began falling a little too early in Missouri to suit Mr. McHargue, and he made haste for Oregon.

Last November, Rev. S. F. Longbottom, of Aleson, died, leaving a wife and six children, which event resulted in the insanity of Mrs. Longbottom, who has been committed to the asylum.

A Eugene company has sold 70,000 pounds of French prunes to Chicago parties at from 4 1/2 cents down. It has 20,000 pounds of Silver and Italian prunes unsold.

Judge J. W. Hamilton has been selected to deliver the memorial address before the Eugene Elk lodge on the first Sunday in December.
