Ordinance No. 37.

An Ordinance to build a sidewalk on north side of lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 in block 4 on Second street...

Sec. 1. That the owners of lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 in block 4 original plat of Coquille City be and are hereby required to build a good and substantial sidewalk six feet wide on the north side of said lots...

Sec. 2. That the owner or owners of lots 6 and 7 in block 14, Elliott's Addition to Coquille City, be and are hereby required to build a good and substantial sidewalk six feet wide on the south side of said lots...

Sec. 3. All of said sidewalk improvements to be made and done within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance.

The supreme court has handed down a decision in the case of W. L. Mast, appellant, vs. Daniel Kern, respondent. The case was on appeal from Coos county and the decision of the lower court was affirmed, as follows:

This case was an action to recover damages for an injury alleged to have been sustained through defendant's negligence. Plaintiff was working in a rock quarry for defendant, one West being superintendent and manager of the quarry.

The court below had directed a nonsuit and plaintiff appealed. "The judgment of nonsuit must be sustained," the opinion says, "for the reason that the negligence of West, if any, was, under the circumstances, the negligence of a co-servant, for which the defendant is not liable."
