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Coquille City's new schoolhouse is now taking shape rapidly, and will be a source of pride to our citizens. The next thing is to use it, and not let it stand idle six or eight months in each year. This can be done greatly to the advantage of our own youth, educating both our own youth and many who will attend from the outside.

The Coquille creamery is curtailing its operations, owing to the winter weather. It has had a long and prosperous season, and will operate only four days in each week for the present—Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays—possibly the balance of this month. The Coos bay creamery, also, has had a prosperous run, and Manager J. M. Collier states that it will close down within the month for the same cause of shortening milk supply. He thinks of constructing a silo for the next season, and favors the winter feeding of cattle with a view to extending the creamery operations throughout the winter and the year round.
