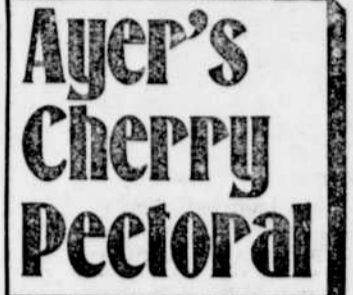

Gussie von Pegert Accidentally Killed.

Word reached us yesterday bringing the shocking intelligence that our young friend—well known by many at this place and throughout this valley—Gussie von Pegert was shot and instantly killed by the accidental discharge of his gun while hunting deer, on the 25th ult., near Boisfort, Washington. We have not a detailed account of the affair, but just the sad fact to make known to our readers. Gussie was born in this valley and a resident here until a few months ago the mother and family—except Fred, who married here and is living up at Laird's—moved to Washington. Many relatives, including the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Perkins, living near Parkersburg, are still residents here, and with the numberless friends are sincerely pained at this distressing casualty.

Fire on the Lower River.

S. S. Wheeler, temporarily living on Frank Stillwell's place, a few miles below town and near the Strang place, was in town Saturday and recited to us a serious loss by fire last Friday evening. Mr. Wheeler and family were camping in a barn while he was filling a contract of handling shinglebolts for Lyons' shinglemill at this place. He had about completed the day's work down at the landing, but remained awhile to kill some ducks. Mrs. Wheeler took the children down to Mr. Norton's to await her husband's coming, while Frank Stillwell went up to the camp to build a fire for supper. Hardly had sufficient time passed for the latter work till Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler and the children faced homeward, being about 6:30 p. m. and growing dark, when they discovered the blaze and the house in flames. They hurried to the scene, but it burned so rapidly that nothing could be saved. Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler lost everything—furniture, trunks, clothing, sewing-machine, children's clothing, everything but what they had on their backs. Mrs. Wheeler saves a calico dress, Mr. Wheeler his overalls, and the children the everyday suits they had on to face the inclement season in. The family will stay at Wm. Norton's till a new cabin is put up. This loss comes heavily on Mr. Wheeler and family at this time. He is a laboring man and now bereft of everything that the family needs for their comfort, and which it will take some time to acquire unless helped by neighbors and friends.
