COOS COUNTY MINES.

Coos county has been given a new impetus this fall, reports the Oregon Mining Journal. A California company has purchased the Divisadero quartz mill and is putting it in running order, expecting to operate it this winter. The Myrtle Point Mining & Development Company has several hundred tons of promising quartz near the mill. The 5-stamp mill was involved in litigation soon after it was erected four years ago, and development work was retarded. The ore in the vicinity will average \$15 in gold per ton, with here and there a rich pocket. The placer miners are ready for a winter's run. They will commence as soon as the rains begin. There were some good clean-ups at the headwaters of the Coquille and Sixes rivers during the summer, and miners in general are hopeful. —Portland Evening Telegram.

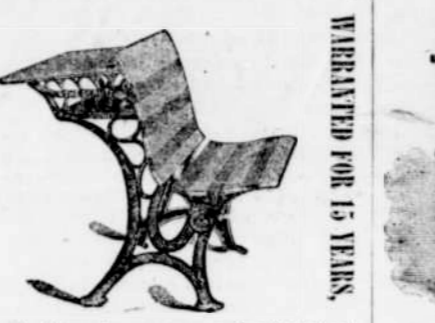
