Gold in Coos. That gold in large quantities exists in Coos county is well known by many of our oldest citizens, but the difficulty in reaching and mining it is a drawback and requires considerable capital in preparing to take it out. Mr. A. Pershaker, who is well posted on the subject and knows to a certainty whereof he speaks, says he would a great deal rather mine for gold here, if he were so situated that he could, than in Alaska or anywhere else, and feels satisfied that he would obtain better results. He says that beyond any doubt whatever, and it has been demonstrated by actual work, that north from Bandon and inland from the coast large quantities of gold exists in the black sand and gravel and it covers an immense territory. The gold is easily enough saved but the trouble and expense lies in getting at it, which would require a considerable outlay of money on the start and a systematic plan of working. There is certainly a splendid field here for a company with money to operate on a very profitable basis, and the days will come when this rich field will be worked for the gold it contains.—Bandon Recorder.

Nearly a Million Pensioners. The late pension appropriation bill reported to the house carries \$145,233,830, being \$4,000,000 more than carried by the current act, due to the increase in pension disbursements, which rose from \$139,400,716 in 1897 to \$154,651,870 in 1898. The total number of pensioners on the rolls is 993,714.

Germany's National Debt Increasing. The Freisinnige Zeitung publishes statistics showing the enormous increase of the German national debt in the last 20 years. There was practically no debt in 1878, but in 1898 it had grown to 721,000,000 marks. In 1893, it was 1,741,000,000 marks, and in October, 1898, 2,268,000,000 marks.

Columbus' Statue Stopped in Spain. Madrid, Dec. 20.—A mob of women at Grenada today considering that the discovery of America was, in their opinion, the principal cause of Spain's misfortunes, stoned the statue of Columbus there.

The insurgents are now demanding that Spain pay a ransom for these prisoners the \$20,000,000 which she is to receive, according to the terms of the peace treaty, from the United States, as compensation for moneys expended in the betterment of the Philippine islands.

The 5-year-old son of O. Pellon, near Oakland, Or., was instantly killed by a tree his father had cut down falling upon him, last Wednesday. The father had repeatedly sent the child back to the house, and this time he had returned unobserved to meet his death. The little fellow was directly beneath the tree and his neck was broken.

Ex-Secretary John Sherman has written a letter to the Anti-Imperial League of Boston, expressing the hope that the senate will reject the treaty and leave the people of the Philippine Islands free from the shackles of Spain and the distant domination of the United States.

At Cleveland, Ohio, Friday, Clement B. Starnes, of the Atlas Flour Mills, of Milwaukee, stated that he expected the big flour combination to be in operation shortly. The combine will have a capitalization of \$30,000,000.

At a mass meeting of business men at Omaha it was decided to hold another and greater Omaha exposition in 1899. Subscriptions amounting to more than \$100,000 were taken.

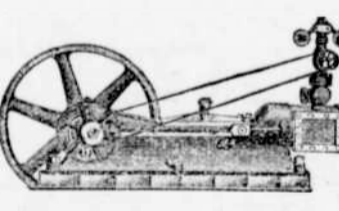
