A MOST DARING ROBBERY

Lorenz's Store Entered and the Sum of \$1100 Taken.

Two Persons Arrested and Now Held by the Sheriff—Examination Before Justice Cecil at 2 p. m. Wednesday.

As early as 9 o'clock last Thursday evening our citizens were startled by the report that a bold robbery had just taken place in the heart of the city and the robbers departed with booty to the amount of about \$1500. Of course but a few minutes passed till the throng of inquirers was made aware that it was Lorenz's store that had been robbed; that two men had approached the store just as Henry Lorenz, the manager, had extinguished the lights—as early as 8:30 o'clock, for he wanted to go to lodge—and was turning the key in the door. Ed Lorenz had preceded Henry a few steps on his way homeward, but the two men—a long one and a short one, masked, and disguised with mackintoshes—landed on him and urged him back to the store-door, where they ordered Henry to open the door. He didn't realize the conditions, and was slow to do so, when they leveled their pistols on him and told him to be quick. Once on the inside they forced a lamp to be lit, and then locked the door, went with Henry and Ed to the safe at the back of the room, where they bound and gagged them—Eddie's face being turned from the safe and Henry commanded to unlock the safe. Henry missed the combination the first time, when the robber in special charge of him tapped him on the head with his pistol and told him to "open up," muttering a threat. The safe opened; at the command of the robber each drawer was pulled out in turn. The third from the bottom had a small amount of coin in it, which was covered by a letter and the drawer was only pulled out a short distance. The robber pressed it back and ordered the next one opened. This was full of silver, which he was not slow to take charge of. Then the lower drawer was opened, in which was considerable gold coin on deposit; this was seized. The robbers then made their victims more secure and departed. They had been gone some while before Eddie released himself and went to Henry's help. Henry then himself hurried around the back way to City Marshal Buck's residence and got a pistol, and being of the opinion that they had horses tied out, he went out as far as Stanley's, hoping to see them and if possible head them off. But parties later saw two men corresponding in description wedding their way to the wharf, who must have taken a boat and left no tracks.

The amount of money actually taken by the robbers is something over \$1100. There was even \$400 in gold belonging to Jesse Bayers; about \$322 belong to the Foresters; and \$400 belonged to Mr. Lorenz. We are authorized to state, too, that a reward amounting to \$550 is offered for the arrest and upon conviction of the parties. Mr. Lorenz offers \$300, and the county court offers \$250.

This was decidedly the boldest act on record in this section. The robbers, who had been seen in conversation for some while across the street from the store, in bright moonlight, a little after 8 o'clock p. m., other business houses open and many people on the streets, boldly approached their victims and demanded their aid to deliver the contents of the safe! Two or more citizens passed the store windows while the robbery was going on, looked in, saw the transaction, but never suspected the devilry associated with it.

APPREHENDED AND HELD. Two young men, E. J. White and Tom Drew, were apprehended Monday at Riverton as the parties committing the robbery and were arrested and delivered at this place by Constable Dad Johnson on the noon boat today. They were arraigned before Justice J. H. Cecil at 2 p. m. today, who set for a hearing at 1 p. m. tomorrow and in the meantime placed them in custody of the sheriff.
