T. Johnson and C. Bunch have been helping Louis Heller in his logging camp.

G. G. Swan has run out of the East Fork 230,000 feet of logs, John Sturdivant about 180,000 feet, and G. P. Miller about 80,000 feet. J. O. Stemler has 220,000 feet to run, and Louis Heller about 160,000 to run, being a total of 810,000 feet.

Coos Bay News. Clyde Lightner was a passenger to the bay on the Weott.

A mild form of lagrippe is reported at various points in the county. The dead pilehards are still numerous under the wharves, notwithstanding the late high tides.

The Alice Blanchard is in the gano trade, running between San Francisco and Clipperton island.

Mrs. Rook, formerly of Summer, arrived from Salem Thursday, and is visiting friends on Catching island.

The work of putting a new span in the county bridge at South slough was completed Thursday by Christensen & Johnson. They will commence repairing the Davis slough bridge, on the Marshfield-Coquille road, in the near future.

Peter Cowan, of the Umpqua life-saving station, was in town Saturday. He informed us that the crew of the station had picked up and buried twelve bodies from the wrecked Atlanta, and that eight more bodies had been picked up by members of the Yaquina station.

THE NEW SALMON LAW. Some of its Main Provisions Briefly Set Forth.

State Fish Commissioner McGuire is deluged with letters asking about the new salmon law, and again a few of its plain provisions are published.

It requires all persons following the vocation of fishing, either as employer or employe, to pay an individual annual license fee of \$1. In addition, he must pay a license upon the appliance used, graded from \$1 to \$25, as follows: Set nets, \$1; gill nets, \$2.50; seines, \$10 for 500, and 2 cents for each additional foot; pound nets, \$15; fish wheels, \$25.

Any appliance used during the close season, viz., between 12 o'clock, noon, February 15, and 12 noon April 15, or between 12 noon the 10th of August and 12 noon, the 10th of September, is subject to confiscation and sale for the benefit of the hatchery fund, and the person using the appliance is subject to a fine of from \$50 to \$1000, and forfeiture of license.

Licenses will be issued any time after January 1, and expire December 31. Commissioner McGuire will send blanks by mail to all persons asking for them, and they can be filled out and returned to the office with the required fee, and the license will be issued and sent to the applicant by return mail. The commissioner will, in a few days, advertise for bids for patrol boat service, and the close season, commencing February 15, will be strictly enforced.

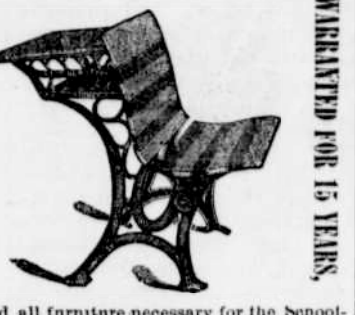
