Silk Culture in Coos.

One of the many rare products, the culture of which demonstrates Oregon's widely diversified resources, is silk. Seventy-six pounds of raw silk of the best grade, valued at \$450, was raised in Coos county. The southern Oregon silk station was founded in 1893. A series of experiments was made with 18 varieties of silk worms imported from Asia and Europe. The result of these experiments, covering a period of years, was the adoption of a new variety of silk worms, a cross between the O Gon (Japanese) and the March (Italian). The eggs of the new variety, together with instructions, were distributed among persons who had mulberry trees. Since the station was founded more than 2186 mulberry trees have been planted which will shortly furnish leaves enough to sustain an enormous army of silk worms. The amount of cocoons raised in the Coos county district in 1897 was 228 pounds, beside that raised in the conducting of simple experiments. The industry is now in a flourishing condition, and adds another laurel to Oregon's wealth. —Portland Evening Telegram.

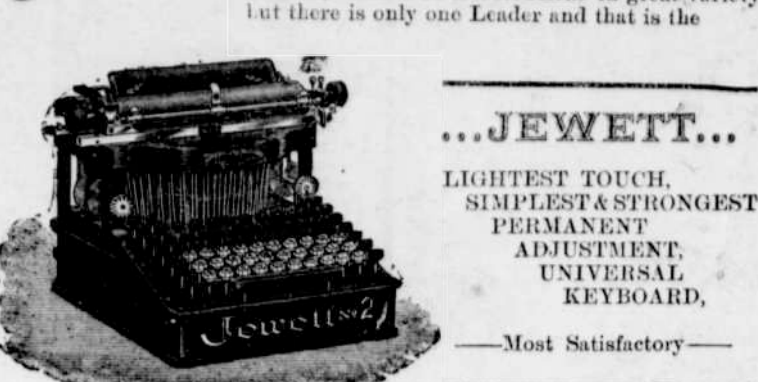
