The Portland people enjoyed sleighriding on Saturday. We have had no snow on the bay so far, this winter, though the coast range of mountains has been white on several occasions.

At the school meeting, Saturday night, fifty-one votes were cast, all of which were in favor of a 4 1/2 mill tax for school purposes.

The Weocott left Yaquina on Thursday for this port. Shortly after sailing it was discovered that her coal bunkers were on fire, and she was obliged to return. She arrived here Sunday night, on her way to San Francisco.

We noticed a fine stick of timber on the logging trucks at the railroad depot, Sunday. It was 98 feet long, two feet in diameter at the small end, and was intended for a mast for a vessel. It came from W. H. Noble's camp at Beaverton.

Assistant Superintendent Bush, of the Oregon Telephone Co., states that all arrangements have been made for the construction early next summer, or as soon as the weather will permit, of a telephone line from Roseburg to Myrtle Point, via the Middle Fork wagon road.

A new life has seized upon the public school interests in several districts in Coos county, which speaks well for them. After you have the facilities, which by duty and law you are compelled to have in some form anyway, you might better have the good that is in them than not, the cost being the same whether you get them or not.

The Brewster Valley school district, No. 65, held a meeting last week and voted a 25-mill tax, for which expenditure the patrons expect to have a comfortable new school building and get out of the short term of school all there is in it.

Grovel Ford, also, district No. 28, held a meeting in December and voted a 23-mill tax, to be collected in two years. Yesterday (Monday, Jan. 16), the McKinley district, No. 27, will vote on a special tax. They expected to vote a 5-mill tax to improve their condition. Fairview is said to be in need of harmonious action for improved facilities, and it is being canvassed.

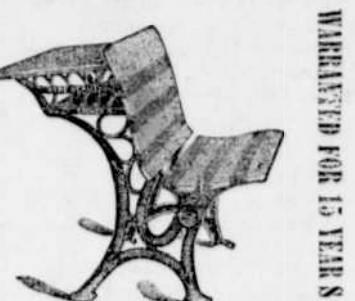
