He is interested in a copper mine in the Rogus River mountains, which is the best yet found in southwest Oregon, and although no well-defined ledge has yet been developed, a sufficient quantity of ore of high value has been uncovered to justify the beginning of mining and shipment.

With the advent of spring a small sized mining boom will strike Rogus River. Several dredges are to be placed on the river, as well as the development of copper and coal mines.

Mrs. A. H. Post, of Sixes river, met with a serious accident last Thursday. Mr. Post being confined to his bed by sickness, Mrs. Post mounted a horse and came to Port Oxford, a distance of seven miles, and having to face the prevailing southerly storm, to procure medicine for her husband.
