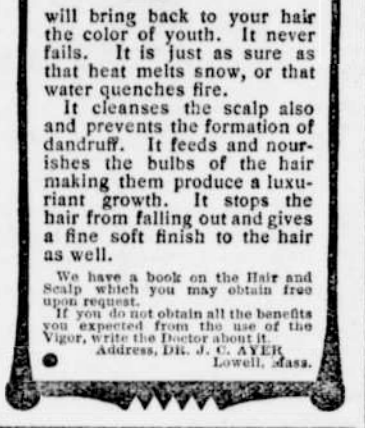

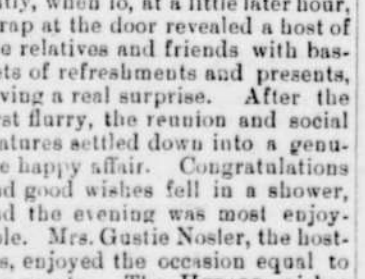

Steamer Barbara Herster is due here today. The steamer and a schooner were sighted outside early yesterday morning.

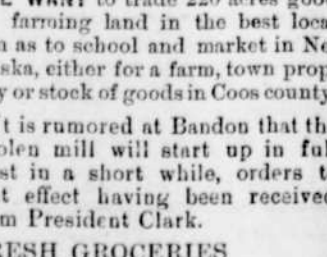

City Ownership of Water Works.

The water service question is beginning to agitate the people, for there is complaint at the excessive charges and poor service afforded by the water company, which has been gaining force these several years past. However, now the agitation is organized, or at least moving in the matter, with a prospect of success. City Recorder W. E. McDuffee last Thursday acted on the demands of the people for a better and more satisfactory service, and after consultation with the town authorities, receiving their endorsement of the proposition, immediately wrote out—filling a copy with the county clerk and posting one on the water franchise claimed—the following notice, in substance:

NOTICE—To all whom it may concern: Know ye, that we, the undersigned, members of the town council of the incorporated town of Coquille City, Coos county, Or., have this day located and claim all the water coming down the south fork of Cunningham creek, in behalf of the said town, for domestic uses, manufacturing purposes and protection against fire. Dated this 17th day of February, 1896. Signed: W. S. Perry, Clm'n, J. H. Cecil, S. P. C. Johnson, J. T. Nosler.

The location and water supply were duly viewed and this action taken under the right of eminent domain, precluding any probable purchase or granting of the franchise to other parties. In the meantime it is proposed to hold a meeting of citizens soon and secure the unity and co-operation of the community.
