SUDDEN AND SAD DEATH.

Elmer Brizeo Expired Alone During a Failing Fit.

Last Tuesday evening our town was somewhat startled by the report of the finding of the body of Elmer Brizeo, who had died alone and suddenly, it was not known just how long before. He lived alone near Wm. Nolley's and A. A. Leach's, on the hill east of town, and as J. C. Watson had been making inquiry for him, the most intimate with him recalled that they had not seen him for a few days and something might be wrong. Wm. Nolley, who lives near Mr. Brizeo's, made it a point to call at Brizeo's home in company with Mrs. Leach, and not finding him in the house, searched the outbuildings and came across his lifeless body in the water closet. The body lay prone upon the floor, but in a cramped position, he evidently having fallen with his head turned up and face buried in his hat against one wall, and feet turned up against the other wall. The facts were made known to the authorities, and Justice Cecil at once summoned a jury of inquest, composed of the following citizens: G. H. Carter, J. C. Watson, W. C. Rose, C. W. Balch, Ira Buzan and A. G. Balch. A few witnesses were called and the jury, with Dr. Culin, examined the body, at the conclusion of which the following verdict was given:

"We, the undersigned, jurors impeached to investigate into the cause of the death of Elmer Brizeo, after full inquiry into and obtaining all the information at hand, and considering the report of Dr. Culin (that deceased came to his death by strangulation during a spasm of which he was subject), find a verdict in accordance with the above facts.

"G. H. Carter, Ira Buzan, A. G. Balch, J. C. Watson, C. W. White, W. C. Rose."

County Judge Harlocker appointed Chas. Harrington to take charge of the property and personal effects of deceased till the county court should appoint an administrator.

Mr. Brizeo had been a sober, industrious and prudent citizen, and had acquired possession of a nice residence and lot on the hill, and two or more lots at other points in the city, but his health had been somewhat impaired by a severe spell of sickness in Colorado about a year ago, and he has been since occasionally visited by an epileptic or other spasm, and seems to have been so taken at this time. He was a single man, living alone. His house was neat and in good condition. Both clock and watch had stopped running, hence the death must have been hardly within 24 hours.

Wednesday the funeral services were held, Rev. E. L. Fitch conducting the same, under auspices of Coquille Lodge No. 53, I. O. E., of which body he was a member. Deceased was about 37 years of age.

Among the letters and papers, as far as found, it was learned that he had a surviving brother in New York state, a brother at or near Bradford, Pa., and a sister resident somewhere there.

The School Board

Met at Hon. W. Sinclair's office last Wednesday, at 3 p. m., with a view to a settlement with J. A. Collier, contractor, as well as the transaction of such other business as might come before the board. There was a full meeting, which was called to order by Chairman Charles Collier, and a statement made by him as to the principal object of the meeting.

Contractor Collier's claims for "extras," a total of \$207.50, was gone over, item by item, some rejected, some scaled down and others allowed, making a total of \$180, approved. Then there was also allowed the sum of \$6.50 for shingles and labor drawn on the general fund.

A statement of the condition of the contractor's claims and the board is about as follows: Terms of contract, \$4900. Amount paid on building, \$4158.63. Balance against building when completed, \$641.37. There is on hand to meet this, about \$655.19, with some credits of unfinished work and unsupplied materials in favor of the district.

In view of the "settlement," just concluded, Mr. Collier was authorized to draw on the building fund for the sum of \$250, pending settlement, to meet claims against him for labor.

The clerk was also instructed to call a special meeting of the legal voters at school meetings in this district, to run 20 days, for the following objects: To vote a tax for the purpose of finishing paying cost of new schoolhouse; also, to elect a clerk for current term.

SATURDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.

The school board convened again last Saturday evening to act on the re-opening of the schools, but a majority of the board still consented to the action of the town board, which on Friday evening before refused to rescind its resolution. The time of the closing of the school was again extended till Monday of next week.

However, as no quarantine ordinance had been passed and the sickness had greatly abated as to numbers of persons ill and the seriousness of the distemper, the scare occasioned by the improvised board of health passed and the people did just as they were a mind to—societies met, billiard halls and saloons were frequented without reserve, business went on and auction sales were thronged, consequence and well people commingled on the streets and everywhere, nothing really being interfered with but the schools and churches, hence the church services Sunday, which were fairly well attended.

We had a pleasant visit last Friday from Capt. Robert Linbridge, of the schooner Lila and Mattie, now loading with lumber at Lyons' mill. The captain is an enthusiastic reformer, not only for seafarers but all along the line, and supplies us with a late copy of the Coast Seaman's Journal containing part of a speech of Ex-Senator Geo. F. Edmunds, of Vermont, on "Imperialism," in which he bears an able warning to the people. We thank Capt. Linbridge and will try and give the article a place.

F. Long, the saddler and harness man who has just moved to this place, at present occupies the Figg building, on Second street, between Prof. Hawkins' new business house and Little's livery stable. He is going right into business and will meet all present demands in his line till he gets his new and large establishment, then he will spread accordingly.

Grandpa and Grandma Devaul lately celebrated the 62d anniversary of their marriage at their home in Myrtle Point. He is 85 years old and she 80. They raised 12 children of their own and two orphans. Both are well known here and at other points in the state, where the good old people have many warm friends.

City Council Meeting Yesterday.

The town board met yesterday afternoon, as per call. The minutes of the meeting last Friday night were read, in which the quarantine was extended indefinitely, and \$5 each allowed to Dr. Minguet and Dr. Kime for their special service as medical inspectors.

On motion of Mr. Cecil, seconded by Mr. Johnson, Dr. W. Culin was elected health officer for balance of council year.

On motion of Mr. Johnson, seconded by W. Rich, W. Sinclair was elected city attorney for balance of council year.

Chairman Perry then read and submitted an ordinance which had been prepared (No. 41) authorizing quarantines and providing penalties for violation of the same, which, on motion of W. Rich, seconded by J. H. Cecil, was adopted; ayes—Cecil, Johnson, Rich; nays—none.

Dr. Culin was asked for a report on the prevailing sickness, and said he did not know, of his own knowledge, that the disease was spreading; and that as for raising the quarantine, it would not be safe to do so until a system of fumigation of the infected homes, clothing, etc., had been made. This, too, the doctor said could only be done safely and thoroughly by a machine he had on the way for that purpose and would be here in a week or ten days. The doctor, too, pronounced the prevailing sickness to be scarlet fever, and that scarlet fever and scarlatina were synonymous terms and one and the same disease; that scarlatina was not a mild form of scarlet fever.

On motion of W. Rich, seconded by J. H. Cecil, it was ordered that a sidewalk be constructed on south side of block No. 26, Elliott's addition—Messrs. D. P. Strang's and C. A. Stine's properties. Adjourned.
