Coos Bay News.

E. G. Flaungan shipped 1200 sacks of potatoes to the city on the Arcata.

The logging camps on the isthmus did well lately, and during a portion of last week kept trains running night and day. The camps at present shipping by the railroad are W. H. Noble's, John Yoakam's and King & Noble's.

Parker Holland had a letter yesterday from Will Holland, who was at Skagway with Grant Beale when he wrote. They had their freight forwarded by the railroad company to Lake Bennett, the price paid being three cents per pound. As they had 10 tons of freight, the bill for forwarding it reached the neat little sum of \$600.

The construction of a sister ship to the Manila will be commenced immediately.
