The gasoline steamer Barbara Herster arrived at our wharf last Wednesday afternoon, just after the Townsend's departure. She, too, brought freight for this place and other river points, and also received lumber at Lyons' mill for the city, and took on coal and other freight on the lower river.

The Washington City contractor to carry the mail between this city and Myrtle Point Sundays of each week failed to respond to his duty, and the service is performed by local carriers. John Barklow made the first run, and now Charles Roberts, it is said, has accepted the duty and carries the mail.

The steamer Townsend came in from San Francisco last Wednesday morning, having made the round trip from this river and return in eight days. She brought a fair cargo of freight, and took on considerable here for the city, while she received coal, lumber, etc., at several of the lower-river points.

(Continued from last page.) The business portion of Coquille City is located in north latitude 43 degrees, 10 minutes and 29 seconds, and longitude 124 degrees, 11 minutes and 12 seconds west of Greenwich.

MENSURATION.

To find circumference of a circle. Rule—Multiply diameter by 3.14159.

To find the diameter of a circle. Rule—Multiply circumference by 0.3183.

To find side of square of equal periphery as circle. Rule—Multiply diameter by 0.7854.

To find diameter of circle of equal periphery as square. Rule—Multiply side of square by 1.2732.

To find side of a square described in a circle—four corners touching the circle. Rule—Multiply diameter of circle by 0.7071.

To find length of an arc. Rule—Multiply length of diameter by number of degrees and again by 0.008727.

To find area of a triangle. Rule—Multiply base by one-half of perpendicular height.

To find area of a parallelogram. Rule—Multiply base by perpendicular height.

To find area of trapezoid. Rule—Multiply half the sum of the parallel sides by perpendicular height.

To find area of trapezium. Rule—Divide trapezium into two triangles and proceed as in single triangles. Add the two areas thus found.

To find area of circle. Rule—Multiply square of diameter by 0.7854, or multiply square of circumference by 0.07958.

To find area of sector of circle. Rule—Multiply length of arc by one-half of radius.

To find area of segment of circle. Rule—Subtract the triangle from sector.

To find side of square of equal area as circle. Rule—Multiply diameter by 0.8862.

To find diameter of circle of equal area as square. Rule—Multiply side by 1.1284.

To find area of parabola. Rule—Multiply base by two-thirds of height.

To find area of ellipse. Rule—Multiply longer diameter by shorter diameter and again by 0.7854.

To find area of regular polygon. Rule—Multiply sum of sides by one-half of perpendicular distance from center to sides.

To find surface of cylinder. Rule—Multiply circumference by height and again by area of both ends.

To find surface of sphere. Rule—Multiply square of diameter by 3.14159, or multiply circumference by diameter.

To find surface of a right pyramid or cone. Rule—Multiply circumference of base or periphery by one-half of slant height.

To find surface of a frustum of a regular right pyramid or cone. Rule—Multiply the sum of peripheries or circumferences of the two ends by one-half of slant height, then add area of both ends.

To find area of irregular land, such as crooked brook on one side and fence on the other. Method—First, divide the length of fence into a number of equal distances and mark on the ground.

Second, from each mark or stake at right angle to fence measure the distance to brook (this is called offset.) Rule—Add together lengths of all off-sets, divide the sum by number of off-sets made and multiply the quotient by the length of fence. [This method is not the most accurate, but the simplest and near enough for ordinary requirements.]

To find solid contents of a prism. Rule—Multiply area of base by perpendicular height.

To find solid contents of a cylinder. Rule—Multiply area of section at right angles to sides by length of side.

To find solid contents of sphere. Rule—Multiply cube of diameter by 0.5236, or multiply surface by one-sixth of diameter.

To find solid contents of a pyramid. Rule—Multiply area of base by one-third of perpendicular height.

To find stability of a pile. Rule—Multiply weight of rain, in pounds, by the fall of rain in feet; divide the quotient by the penetration of pile also in feet, and again divide by 8. The result will be the weight of load, in pounds, which the pile will safely support.

To find horsepower of an engine. Rule—Multiply area of cylinder in square inches by number of feet traveled by piston per minute, and then by the pressure of steam per square inch in pounds; divide the quotient by 33,000. If the engine is a high-pressure type, deduct 13 per cent, or, if condensing type, deduct 25 per cent.
