THE STEAMER CHILKAT WRECKED.

Ten Lives Met Death in the Waves—One Coos County Boy Saved and One Drowned.

Further reports from the scene of the wrecked steamer Chilkat, which capsized while crossing over the Humboldt bar on the 4th, state that of the 19 persons on board 10 were lost.

The names of all the seamen lost are not yet known. The drowned include, however, the Captain F. B. Anderson, the second officer, name unknown; E. Capoll, cook, and A. Johnson, seaman.

The children of the crew saved were: Peter Jensen, mate; William Backwood, chief engineer; Clyde Lightner, first assistant engineer; T. C. Bohall, steward; William Grip, fireman; Peter Hansen, fireman; William Black, seaman.

Of the people saved, six got away in a boat and were picked up by the steamer North Fork, which had passed out just ahead of the Chilkat. They were carried on to San Francisco, and will reach there today (April 5th).

The Chilkat was almost over the bar when a big sea struck her forward, carried away the wheelhouse and the wheel, disabling her steering gear and smashing her upper deck to rig a temporary steering gear, but before anything could be done, the helpless boat fell into the trough of the sea, and the men came up from below with the information that water had put out the fires.

The taking of trout during the months of November, December, January, February and March is prohibited.

It is unlawful at all times to take trout, char, or salmon less than five inches in length.

Taking of eastern brook trout and Loch Leven trout at any time is prohibited.

The Harmon act (senate bill 107) provides that the only appliances with which salmon, salmon trout, mountain trout and brook trout may be taken from Rogue river, above its junction with the Illinois river, are the hook and line and the gig.

Supreme Court Decisions.

Washington, April 3.—In the supreme court of the United States today a decision was handed down by Justice Peckham confirming the validity of the war revenue act, imposing taxes on transactions of the boards of trade and similar institutions. In another case a similar opinion was rendered with regard to taxes upon transactions at the stockyards.
