Statistical Reports of the Public Schools of Curry County.

Salem, April 2.—In the office of State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, yesterday, four reports of county superintendents were received, showing the condition of the educational affairs in their respective jurisdictions. The counties reporting were Washington, Benton, Lake and Curry.

CURRY COUNTY'S REPORT.

Supt. W. S. Guerin reports an enumeration of 706, and an enrollment of 427, of these only twelve were under 6 years of age; twenty boys and sixteen girls attended school out of their districts; the average daily attendance was 361. Nineteen teachers—six males and thirteen females—had charge of the schools at average salaries of \$41 for males, and \$35 for females; the county superintendent's salary being placed at \$200. The value of the schoolhouse property is placed at \$4485; furniture, \$1120, and the apparatus, books, etc., \$824. The county has twenty-six districts, but only twenty-five of them had school during the year, and in these there are eighteen schoolhouses, seventeen of them being supplied with Webster's dictionaries. The money, received for school purposes, was \$3776.09, of which amount \$3756.79 was expended, leaving a balance of \$19.30 in the hands of school clerks; at the same time the county treasurer had \$9.21 unexpended, belonging to the schools.

For the Housewife.

To clean a spice mill, grind a handful of raw rice. A whisk broom is just the thing to clean the horseradish grater.

Corsets with the whalebones removed make good cleaning cloths. Wood ashes put in a woolen bag and placed in the water will make hard water soft.

Pickles or vinegar will not keep in a jar that has ever had any kind of grease kept in it.

Put a little household ammonia on a rag and clean off the rolls of the wringer before putting it away.

Drain pipes that are sour or impure may be cleaned with lime water or carbonic acid or chloride of lime.

When you drive a nail into the wall, clothespress or closet to hang things on, drive it through a spool up to the head.

A small box filled with lime and placed on a shelf in the pantry or closet will absorb dampness and keep the air dry and sweet.

To brighten the inside of a coffee or tea-pot fill it with water, add a small piece of soap, and let it boil about 45 minutes.
