Manila, May 4.—General McArthur carried San Tomas after encountering strong resistance. Hale moved on the right and Wheeler attacked on the left in a daring charge in which Col. Funston again distinguished himself.

AGAINST TRUSTS.

A Missouri Court Makes an Important Ruling. St. Louis, Mo., May 2.—In the circuit court of appeals today, with Judges Bland, Biggs and Bend on the bench, a unanimous decision was made in an appeal in a case to the effect that a trust cannot cloak its objects under the form of a corporation, and evade the penalty provided for violations of the Missouri anti-trust law of 1891.

San Francisco, May 2.—Judge Hawley today signed the final decree in the case of the United States government vs the Coal Dealers' Association, of California. Some months ago Judge Hawley granted an injunction, and by the final decree the members of the coal dealers' association are enjoined and prohibited from further agreeing, combining or conspiring or acting together to maintain prices on coal brought here from British Columbia, Washington or Oregon.

Chicago, May 4.—Representatives of the 22 leading plow manufacturing concerns in the United States are assembling in Chicago to await the result of their committee's action in New York. If all goes as is planned, the American Plow Company, with a capital of \$65,000,000, will take its place among the giant combinations of the country.

there unlawfully and feloniously stole, steal and carry away in the store of N Lorenz \$1100 in gold and silver coin in denomination to the grand jury unknown, the coin being then and there in the custody and care of the said N Lorenz, said bill of indictment being endorsed "not a true bill" and signed V N Perry, foreman of the grand jury. And it is ordered by the court that said defendants be discharged from custody.

FINAL REPORT OF GRAND JURY. To the Hon. J. W. Hamilton, Judge: The grand jury for a final report at the May, 1899, term of the above court, says:

That we have carefully examined into the different criminal cases committed and triable within Coos county, Oregon, so far as the same has come to our knowledge, and we have returned true bills in these cases only when we thought the evidence would warrant a conviction in the trial court.

We also visited the various county officers within the court building and do hereby express our approval of the manner in which the said officers and the records therein are kept.

As a result of our investigation, we find the sewerage of the building, especially that of the jail is defective; also that the bathroom of the jail is without means of heating water for use therein; also the corridors of the jail are wholly without a fence or other protection to prevent the approach of parties from the outside; also the ladies' cell in the jail is without a closet or means of heating. We also find some of the rooms within the courthouse are not provided with hat-racks, wall hooks or other conveniences for hats, coats or other articles.

We therefore recommend that the county court of Coos county, Or., immediately make an investigation of said matters and improve the same.

We also feel it our duty and desire to express our thanks to Geo. M. Brown, district attorney, for the fair and courteous manner in which he treated all witnesses before this body and readily favored this jury and do hereby recognize in him an able and efficient officer.
